Electric power demands of atomic energy installations is expected to reach 61,769,000,000 kilowatt hours by 1960 and 80 per cent of this energy will be generated by coal.

Drivers' Exams Due Saturday Express Shipments Out

Persons wishing original licenses or permits to drive are asked to file applications well ahead of the scheduled closing hour in order to assure time for completion of the required license test.

Chauffeurs Now Getting Licenses

Oregon chauffeurs can now apply for renewal of licenses, Secretary of State Earl T. Newby announced Thursday.

Renewal for 1956 can be accepted at all branch offices of the secretary of state, provided that the applicants have a currently valid drivers' license and hold a 1955 chauffeurs' license.

Mailing of the 1956 commercial licenses will begin on or about December 1, 1955, Newby said.

Newby added that any new chauffeurs' license issued between now and December 15, when 1956 licenses become valid expire December 31st.
