The club's next meeting will be Tuesday night in the City Hall. All women who are interested in its activities are invited to attend.

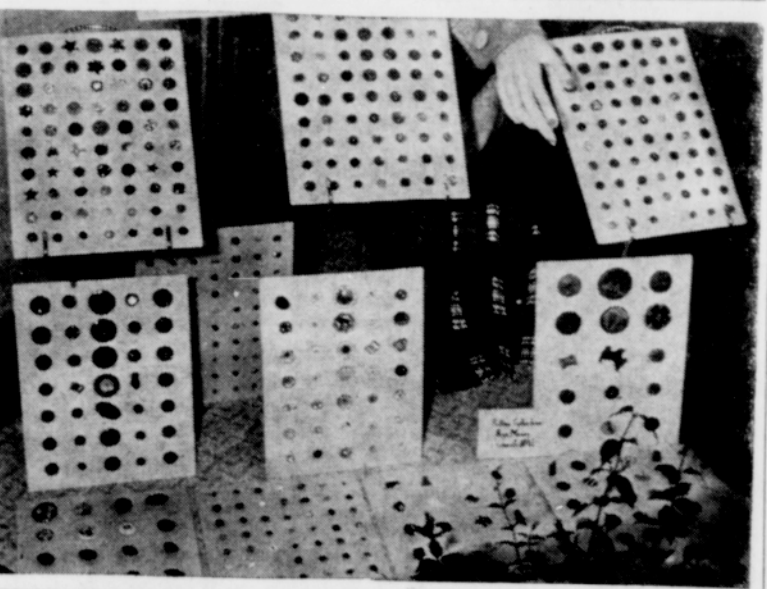
Guests Honored By VFW Auxiliary

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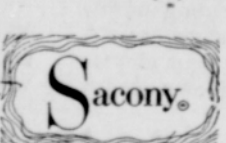
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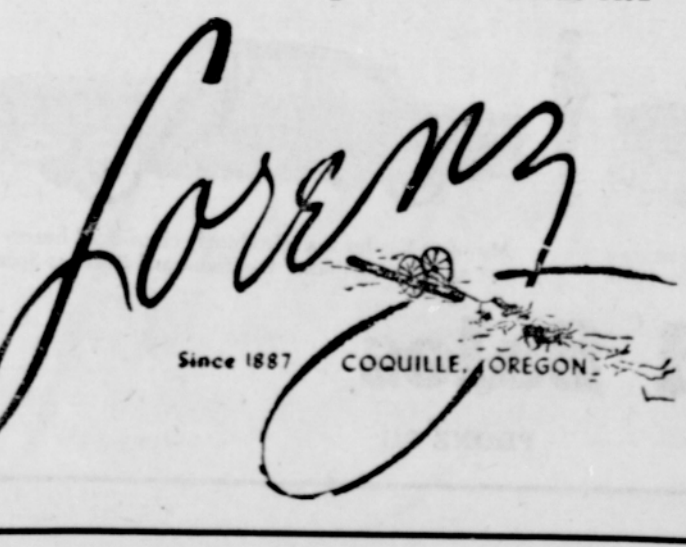
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
