Ellsworth Sets County Visiting

ROSEBURG (Special) — The next several weeks will be travel weeks for Oregon's Fourth District Congressman, Harris Ellsworth. Announcing his schedule for visiting the seven counties Ellsworth said he will be in Curry county from October 16 to 19, and in Coos Bay area the remainder of that week until the twenty-third. Except for a scheduled talk to the Brookings Rotary club, definite plans for speaking dates have not been made.

His travel in the district, the Congressman explains, is not in the nature of a speaking tour. It is his custom each year to visit all parts of the district. He wants, he says, to get up-to-date on local developments and obtain first hand knowledge of the problems of the people of the district. He plans to inspect all government projects and contact the local offices of government agencies.

The following week, October 24 through October 29, Congressman Ellsworth will be in Josephine and Jackson counties, concluding with attending an American Legion meeting Saturday.

The week beginning Monday, October 31, Ellsworth will spend in Linn county. While there he will also attend the annual meeting of the Willamette Basin Commission to be held in Corvallis November 3, and then go to Portland for the Republican Western conference.

Following the Portland conference, Ellsworth says he will spend a few days at home and get caught up on office work and will address the banquet of the Oregon Motor Court Association on November 8 in Roseburg. Then he will spend a week in Lane County.

The Congressman and Mrs. Ellsworth are planning to leave for Washington, D. C. early in December. Meanwhile, he states, his office in the Pacific Building in Roseburg is open and he can be reached whether at home or traveling by contacting that office.

His office in Washington, D. C. is also open full time, he says, affording him prompt and effective contact with government agencies there.
