

THE ROAD REPORT

Headmaster Talks About Progress Made During the Month of October.

District No. 1.

Little has been done this month with the exception of general maintenance, such as clearing out ditches, brush, etc.

Coos Bay North Project.

This road is practically complete from Haynes Slough to Houser, and we will discontinue same with the exception of the Draw Bridge Contract, stationmen, and Dockey Clearing Crews. The camp and equipment will be moved to North Bend next week.

Ladd & Harris have driven 7,000 lineal feet of piling and erected 76,000 F. B. M. of lumber during the month. The Draw Spans are 25% complete.

District No. 2.

Considerable maintenance work and a small amount of graveling work on the Daniels Creek Road constitutes the work done in the district this month.

District No. 3.

Considerable maintenance work has been done throughout the district, and the Norway-Argo road has been rocked for a distance of about a quarter of a mile in very good shape.

Empire-Sunset Bay Contract.

The heavy grading on the Frank Norton contract is 99% complete, and will be ready for final estimate, as soon as the contractor can do his finishing and dressing up.

Dean & Brown have laid 2,600 square yards of macadam, and 700 cubic yards of finish grading on the Empire-Sunset Bay contract.

Coquille - Marshfield Section Coast Highway—Davis Slough to Coquille.

19,660 yards of earth; 6,000 yards of rock; 28,800 sta. yards overhaul; 3 1/2 acres grubbing and clearing, and 3400 feet F. B. M. lumber is the work completed on this project this month. This completes this section, and same will come up for final estimate next month.

Coquille-Cedar Point.

Only 6,000 yards of earth has been moved on this section this month. The contractor, Mr. Perham, has been giving his attention to the finishing of the Davis Slough Section.

Coos City-Summer Project.

This project is 55% complete, 8,000 yards of material being moved this month, and 4 M. B. M. lumber has been placed. The contractors, Moon and Gidley, have experienced considerable difficulty in securing help on this work.

Millington-Bunker Hill.

This section is 41% complete, 4,500 yards of material having been moved this month into the Millington Hill; this fill should be completed next month.

Coquille-Myrtle Point Road.

Since our report for last month, the heavy grading work at the Old Johnson Mill hill has been postponed. The rocking work has been progressing satisfactorily, and should be completed in the next two weeks.

District No. 4.

A small amount of maintenance work and the repair of a bridge, the Lawhorn road North of the Coos Bay wagon road, and the completion of the earth and rock work on the approaches to the Gravel Ford Bridge has been done this month.

Gravel Ford Bridge.

Mr. Bennett, the contractor, has practically completed his contract on this job, and will, no doubt, be ready for final estimate next month.

District No. 5.

There has been considerable maintenance work, together with donation work on the following: Powers & Hayes Road, clearing and grading; Hermann Hill on the Eckley Road, graveling; Ward Creek Road, graveling; South Fork Road, graveling; Ward Creek and Two Mile Road, clearing and grading; Halls Creek Road, graveling, and also the Slingby Bridge has been rebuilt.

Myrtle Point Bridge.

Progress has been satisfactory on this work. The contractors, Portland Bridge Company, have practically completed the S. Pacific over-crossing, and approaches, and are well along in the erection of the steel span. This job should be finished next month.

District No. 6.

Very little has been done in this district this month, except the small grading job on the upper Two Mile Road.

Bandon-Two Mile Surfacing.

2640 cubic yards of finish grading, and 2500 square yards of macadam; 5,000 lineal feet of cutters have been laid this month. The cost of grading was 51c per cubic yard, macadam 11.26 per square yard and gutters 22c per lineal foot.

Bandon-Curry County Section Coast Highway.

8,600 yards earth and 690 yards rock moved, and 20,000 F. B. M. has been installed in bridges and culverts this month. This job is 80% com-

plete, and the contractors will probably have to ask a 50 day extension of time.

Bandon-Bandon Bay.

Highlights on the condensation proposition Monday led up to an altercation between H. J. McDermid, a member of the citizens' committee and E. E. Oakes, in which both lost their tempers and engaged in a fight. The trouble started in the Nelson office in the rear of the Bandon Hardware store but friends interfered, after a preliminary skirmish, and each of the parties was started out in a different direction. A few minutes later they met again just outside the building, and, speaking the vernacular, "stuff was off." There seems to be a diversity of opinion as to the observance of the "rules of the game," some contending that ruthlessness was indulged in. However, after hearing evidence on both sides it is concluded the case could only be intelligently decided by a hearing before the Hague tribunal. At any rate considerable damage was done, and friends of both parties deplore the fact that it should have become necessary to engage in hostilities when there were so many neutrals ready to arbitrate. No arrests were made but both parties voluntarily went before Municipal Judge Mast and pleaded guilty to disturbing the peace, whereupon they paid the minimum fine of \$5 each.—Bandon World.

He Gave Himself Away.

Game Warden J. M. Thomas was today relating an instance which happened a few days ago, and resulted in obtaining information regarding the killing of deer by a man he had suspected for some time. It appeared that the man had killed a deer on the date in question, and seeing several hunters coming towards him, hid the deer behind a log, and then peered over it to see if the other hunters were after him or simply shooting ducks. As he stuck his head above the log, one of the hunters fired a shot at some ducks and the man behind the log was in range. He received several shot some in the arm and others in the shoulder. Being injured he set up a noise and when the hunters went to assist him, they found him with the deer he had killed. Warden Thomas said the man will be prosecuted soon in one of the justice courts.—Record.

Black Sand Capitalists.

Six prominent men who are interested in the black sand mining operations conducted on Cut Creek by Messrs. Otis, Harris and associates, are guests at the Hotel Bandon, says the World. They are: Dr. D. M. Otis, Springfield, Ill.; and Dr. Morten, W. B. Adams, T. H. Kinney, E. A. Powell, and Ora E. Daggett, all of Taylorville, Ill.

The men are spending most of their time at the mine where machinery, the installation of which has just been completed, is being tried out in beginning actual mining. The company in which these people are interested has spent a large amount of money here in trying out on a commercial scale a process of saving all the values contained in black sand, not alone the gold and platinum.

Some Sense at Last.

From state press notes we hear that the state fire protective association has announced that next year they will begin early in the season to burn out dead logs and rank brush close to timber areas. They will thus endeavor to save the timber by protecting it, instead of protecting the brush to destroy the timber should a bad fire get started late in the summer. The state guardians are at last seeing the light of common sense. Now if the U. S. forestry department heads will come to their senses and order likewise, there is a good chance for this county to get back to the condition which invited the white man to settle in it—large areas of open grazing land and vast areas of well protected timber.—Gold Beach Reporter.

Everybody Fishing There.

Several people spent some time Sunday at the wharves at Reedsport and the co-operative cannery fishing for Tom cod and perch with hook and line. Everyone—men, women and boys—were having good luck catching them. The Reedsport Fish Co. pays four cents a pound for the perch and two or three dollars a day can be made catching them, which gives pin money for the women, cigars for the men, chewing gum for the girls and ice-cream cones for the boys.—Reedsport Courier.
