State Board Buys Aerial Tram.

The state Lime Board, at a meeting at Salem Monday, decided to purchase an aerial tram from the Greenback Mining Company, of Grants Pass, to transport lime products from the Beaman lime quarry, leased by the state, to the railroad. The tram will cost \$20,000. New trams would cost between \$15,000 and \$20,000.

About 4000 feet of rough gully land lies between the quarry and the railroad and the country to be traversed is in such condition that the construction of a road would be impractical.
