### Southern Oregon Lands Again.

A Portland paper contains this additional information about the present status of the old Coos Bay Wagon Road lands, in which Coos county and the port, road and school districts are now interested to the extent of over \$200,000.

"S. W. Williams, special assistant to the United States attorney general, received telegraphic information that the Supreme court had granted the Southern Oregon company permission to file a petition in the settlement of a land grant case in which about 100,000 acres of Southwestern Oregon lands are involved.

"The Coos Bay Wagon Road company sold, contrary to law, it is charged, the total of 100,000 acres in the grant to two men who afterwards organized the Southern Oregon company. According to the law, sales are limited to 100 acres to each purchaser.

"Four hundred acres of the tract contains accessible timber and the Coos Bay Lumber Co. offered to buy the timber to fill ship contracts for the government. The question of petition was taken to the Supreme court, which has now granted the company the right to put it before the federal district court to determine whether the timber is to be sold to the highest bidder and converted into lumber while the sale case is pending."

It is supposed the 400 acres referred to here consists of land near Sumner, which the Smith-Powers people are figuring on taking over.

### Bertie Minor's Voyage.

Those who remember the Bertie Minor as one of the dismantled schooners tied up for years at Bandon on the lower river, will be interested in the following San Francisco press dispatch of last Saturday:

The schooner Bertie Minor, which has just arrived from Peapack, ran into the tail-end of a storm when 600 miles off shore and lost four sails and a small portion of her deckload of coconuts.

In addition to her cargo of copra and coconuts, the schooner brought up four refugees of the vessel destroyed by the German raider Beadler. They comprised John M. Tweed, first mate of the A. B. Johnson, two members of the crew, and the cook of the E. C. Slade.

### Destructive Fire at Bancroft.

Word has been received by Roy Osborne from his mother, Mrs. F. L. Christie, of the Bancroft, vicinity, that the family had suffered a severe loss less recently as a result of the Bine Mountain forest fire. The flames, supposed to have been started by someone as an aid in hunting, burned for miles through the heavy timber of that section and destroyed millions of feet of fine saw-timber. Mr. Christie had about 600 cedar railroad ties ready for delivery—and when the fire had passed there remained but 13. The flames destroyed their barn and other buildings, and it was with difficulty that the house was saved.—Bandon World.

### The Tramp on her last trip from Coos Bay to Gold Beach was to take down a consignment of 2 1/2 million salmon eggs from the state hatchery, for the Meclay hatchery at Indian creek, Curry county.
