Successful Fishing Season.

The fishing season for chinook and silverside salmon on the local river closed on the morning of the 20th and the Prosper and Macleay canneries will probably be ready to shut down within a short time. The past season has been one of the most successful in many years, the run of fish having been far in excess of any for at least ten years back. There were two seines operating on the river and probably between 25 and 30 gillnetting outfits. F. A. Holman, who had charge of the seine for the Sam Naas cannery, alone caught 18,000 fish. It is estimated that on account of the unusual high prices paid for fish between \$50,000 and \$75,000 was paid out on the lower river this season.—Bandon World.

May Grow Oysters Again.

When the dredging of the channel up Coos Bay to Marshfield was in progress three or four years ago great quantities of oyster shells were found and used in filling in the marshes which gave the name to that city. Now the U. S. Bureau of Fisheries is going to see if a new oyster crop cannot be grown there by replanting. One theory is that the oysters were killed by the ashes which fell in the water during the great fire which destroyed so much timber on this coast a hundred years or more ago.

Ford Ships 200 Beef Cattle.

J. E. Ford, cattle buyer from Marshfield, stopped in Bandon Tuesday night with a herd of 202 beef cattle, which he purchased through Curry and southern Coos. He started from Rogue river with 88 head and added to the herd as he came along. The cattle are mostly feeders which will be fed during the winter.
