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### Another Land Sale Case.

The case of Peter Peterson and Hilda Peterson, of Haynes Inlet, against Josephine M. Rennie, T. W. Rennie, M. H. Klockars, William Cox, A. R. Pollexfen and others, was decided by Judge Coke in favor of the plaintiffs, Peter Peterson and Hilda Peterson, and the plaintiffs recovered a judgment against the defendants for \$8,832.64, together with the costs of the proceedings.

The case involved the sale of what is known as the Peterson ranch on Haynes Inlet, which was sold in 1909 for \$14,000. Mr. Peterson was granted judgment and in failure of defendants to pay the judgment is to recover the ranch and to take immediate possession. The case has been in court in one form or another for practically a year.

Defendants refused to make the payments claiming the title to the premises were defective and contending that 40 acres of bottom land, which Mr. Peterson attempted to sell, did not, as a matter of fact, belong to the Petersons. The court, however, found the contract between Peterson and the defendants provided he was to sell only the interest which he had in and to the premises and that the time for the defendant to object to the title had gone by as the defendants have been in possession of the ranch for the past several years.

The Petersons upon the failure of the defendants to pay the amount of the judgment will recover back the property and the defendants are given until the first of June, 1918, to redeem.—Record.

This case in some of its features resembles the Weekly-Jeffries case from Gravel Ford in which the decision was in favor of the purchaser, in the State Supreme court.
