More improvements at the Sitka In order to secure more stacking room for their product, the Sitka Spruce company has just built an additional dock at their plant down the river, 100x100 feet. A large modern barn is being constructed and a 36-foot roadway will be built from the new dock toward the river.

Another improvement is the elevated walk which will enable the employees to reach the mill without walking in the mud or trespassing on railroad right of way.

A great many other improvements and changes have been made at the mill the past few months and the management feels now that the period of preparation is past and that they are ready to operate the plant at capacity run.
