Fine Conservation Record.

The report this week closed the Food Conservation five-week campaign. Over 400 cards were returned reporting a total of 2496 wheatless meals, 5157 meatless meals and 8408 wasteful meals. The increase in the number of cards returned is due to the fact that many cards for the full five weeks were turned in together. The full report for five weeks shows that there have been 4300 wheatless meals, 7350 meatless meals and 1000 wasteful meals with an average of 8.5 in the first class 15 for the second and 20.5 for the third. This exceeds the required number except in the third class and even in that the average is very good being only 3 short of standard required. The result of the campaign will be reported to the Food Commission in Washington. Two extra notations were reported, viz: 12 sugarless meals and "1 endless meal." The writer is consumed with curiosity to know what kind of meal is "endless." He has found many meals unobtainable and has therefore had to eat less of it than he otherwise would have. This is the nearest approach to "endless" meals that has come to his notice but they are not satisfying. Being a student of economy he would appreciate a menu of these "endless" meals so as to reduce the H. C. L. Now that the campaign is over, it is not to be understood that conservation of food is at an end for its purpose was to find out what we could do and now that we have set the above standard for ourselves let us keep at it with the realization that by doing so we shall be doing our best for our Country in support of the principles that have brought us into the present conflict from which may we soon be victoriously free.

Will Train Stenographers.

Anderson's Business College has received many calls recently for stenographers and typists and Mr. Anderson informs us that in a short time the college will be in position to fill these positions with well trained students. The government is also anxious to secure stenographers for all departments and there is no question but that those who finish the course this year will find employment seeking help.

Beginning Jan. 1, when the next term opens, Gregg shorthand will be the system used in the school and a new instructor has been secured for this department who will arrive the last of this month.

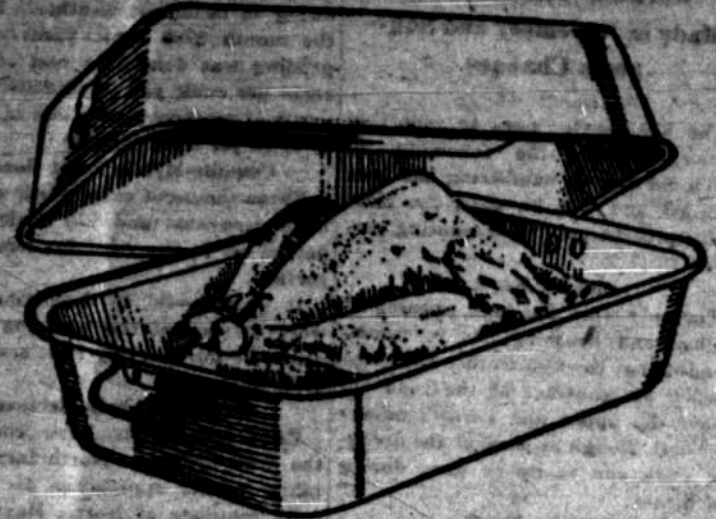
