City School Notes.

Gordon Hanscom celebrated his birthday (he did not say what one) in the appropriate manner Tuesday by bringing a large cake to school, thus complying with a precedent established last year. The faculty and seniors thoroughly enjoyed the cake, and are only sorry that birthdays for Gordon come only once a year.

The new windows are in at last and there is much rejoicing therefor. Mr. Noblet, Mr. Almack, Herbert Lukens and Will Oeding borrowed a set of tools from a half a dozen or more sources one Saturday and bright and early set to work. They have been expecting a vote of thanks from the high school for the efficient and workmanlike manner in which the job was done but are too modest to suggest it themselves. Therefore, to date no one has been thoughtful enough to propose that recognition of the performance be given. It is expected, however, that the matter will be attended to soon in assembly. Another job has already been laid out for another Saturday: the making of a cabinet for the apparatus used in the science department.

Dr. Endicott talked to the high school students last Friday during the assembly period on the care of the teeth.

In a questionnaire regarding the number of hours the high school students spent in study every day it was found that smallest number of hours spent in study was reported as one, and the highest number as 11. The average ran about four. This is exclusive of the recitation periods. The freshman class apparently lead all others in study. The lowest number of hours spent in study was by a sophomore.

The girls' chorus of the high school are practicing for a special number on the program at the community Christmas tree to be held on the evening of the 24th.

The Thronyde writing scale has been posted in the high school assembly room, and students have been comparing their handwriting with the specimens given on the scale. So far, no one has been discovered who writes as well as the best example on the scale.

Twenty-nine new books have been added to the high school library and may be used by patrons of the school district by applying to the librarian. Among the new books that will probably prove of value and interest are: Household Hygiene, Principles of Cookery, Nutrition and Diet, Health in Home and Town, McLoughlin and Old Oregon, Scientific Ideas of Today, Modern Advertising, and The Principles of Fruit Growing. There are also several books of fiction.

Tests in speed in the class in typewriting will be given every month hereafter. The following in order were first in the December test: John Stanley, Genevieve Chase, Marvel Skeels, Katherine Hersey, and Fred Wifer.

The study of retardation of school children is being conducted in the grades under the direction of a committee of the state teachers' Association. This work was commenced last year, and is merely a continuation of

last year's work. This year special attention is given to children who come in from one room rural schools. In a similar study made a year ago in the schools of Oklahoma it was found that the greatest reason for retardation in the rural schools was irregular attendance.

A meeting of the Coos County Round Table will be held in Coquille a short time after the holidays. The subject for discussion will be supervision. County Superintendent Baker will discuss the subject from the point of view of a county superintendent, Robert Goetz, of North Bend, from the point of view of the city superintendent, and F. C. Young, of Marshfield, from the point of view of the teacher. J. W. Noblet will also give a report of the proceedings of the state teachers' association, he being the delegate from the Round Table.

School will be closed Friday for Christmas holidays until January 2nd. Mr. Almack and Mr. Noblet will attend the state teachers' association at Portland during the vacation.

Several members of the Teachers' Training class took the teachers' examination this week.

The Girls' Basket Ball team and the boys team went to Norway to play their teams Friday evening.

G. L. Steinman, from Eugene, representative of the Underwood Typewriter Co., visited the schools on Wednesday.

Slides were shown to the high school Monday and Tuesday. Titles of the pictures shown were, "Taming of the Fire God," and "Industrial Safety." After being shown here the pictures were sent on to Myrtle Point.

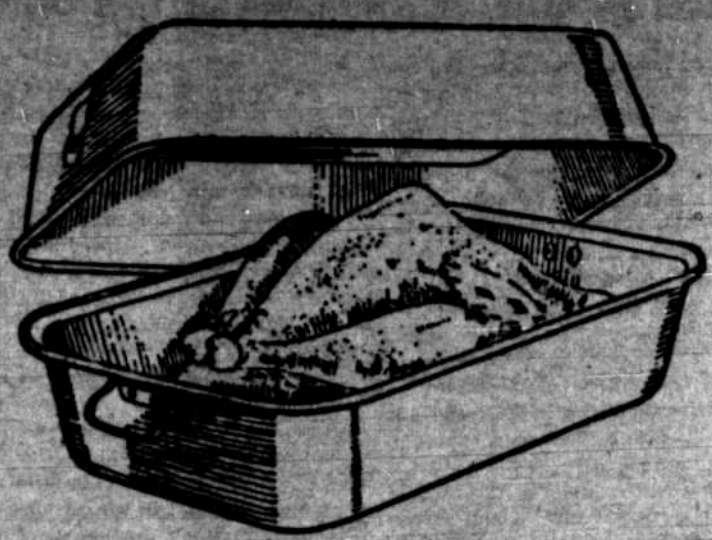
