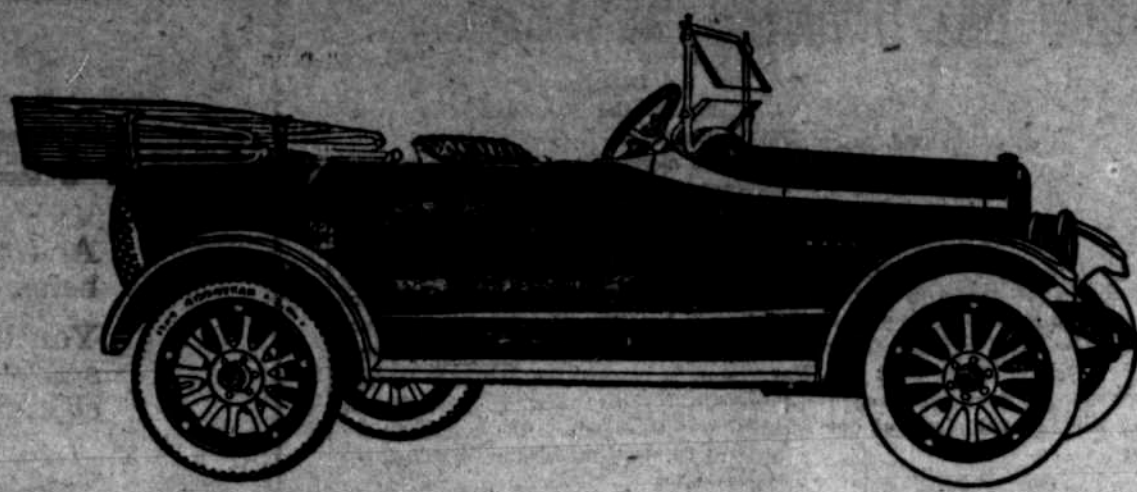

Expensive Whistling.

Fifteen dollars is what it cost a young man to whistle in Justice Wright's court at Port Orford Monday morning.

Saturday night D. Davidson and Pete Fitzhugh sampled too freely of extracts secured at some of the stores and as a result were placed under arrest by constable Jas. Lane for disturbing the peace. Monday forenoon they were arraigned before Justice Wright. During the hearing Davidson, with a cigarette in his mouth, started whistling a jaunty air, whereupon the court gave him a lecture upon the dignity of the law and put his fine at \$25, while his companion was let off with a \$10 penalty. The young men decided to board their fines out in the county bastille at the rate of \$2 per day and were taken to Gold Beach the same day by constable Lane.

When asked if it was now safe to whistle in Port Orford, Justice Wright replied that it depended upon the tune, the time and the place.

Foresters Regiment Full.

District Forester Geo. H. Cecil, of Portland, has discontinued issuing recruiting cards for voluntary enlistment in the 20th Engineers (Forest) and is no longer seeking applications from registrants under the draft law for induction into this regiment. This is in accordance with advice received from the Forester. Enough men have been enlisted or furnished induction papers to complete the ten battalions of mill, woods, and logging railroad workers for the 20th Engineers (Forest), the largest regiment in the world. The Forest Service cooperated with the War Department in securing for this regiment woodsmen, lumbermen, foresters, and others skilled in some line of woods or mill work. The regiment's full quota will contain 10 battalions of 750 men each.

Insurance Time Extended.

The following telegram has been received by the State Council of Defense for Oregon from George F. Porter, Chief State Councils Section, Council of National Defense, Washington, D. C.

"The time for filing applications for war risk insurance has just been extended by Congress to April 12th. Automatic insurance, however, has ceased entirely, and no man is now insured by the government unless he applies. This makes voluntary application doubly important. Have your publicity man spread news through state and continue campaign to bring family influence to bear on men not yet insured."
