Owing to the scarcity of teachers the Oregon Normal School will offer a War Emergency Course of twenty weeks outlined by the Superintendent of Public Instruction. The course will begin with each of the terms commencing Nov. 18, 1918; Feb. 8, 1919; and April 12, 1919. The Superintendent of Public Instruction will consider it equivalent to the Teachers' Training Course and issue a certificate upon its completion valid to teach in the elementary grades for one year.

This Course will be open to those who have had two years or more of high school work or its equivalent and who are at least eighteen years of age.

The cattle market has recovered from its demoralized condition of last week and all grades are selling steady at following quotations: Prime steers \$12.00-13.00; Good to choice steers \$11.00-12.00; medium to good steers \$9.75-11.00; fair to medium steers \$8.25-9.25; common to fair steers \$6.00-8.00; choice cows & heifers \$8.00-9.00; medium to good cows & heifers \$6.00-7.25; fair to medium cows & heifers \$5.00-6.00; canners \$3.00-4.00; bulls \$5.00-7.00; calves \$9.00-12.00; stockers & feeders \$6.00-8.00.

The new arrivals in the hog alleys over night was 500 head. Monday 2450. The market suffered a decline yesterday of 25 cents and as a consequence trading today is slow and has an undertone of weakness. Quotations: Prime mixed \$19.25-19.50; medium mixed \$18.75-19.00; rough heavies \$17.25-17.50; pigs \$15.50-16.50; bulk \$18.75-19.00.

With a nominal run of sheep and lambs over night the mutton market remains stationary at quotations as follows: Prime lambs \$12.00-14.00; fair to medium lambs \$9.00-11.00; yearlings \$10.00-11.00; wethers \$9.00-10.00; ewes \$6.50-9.00.
