WILL BE NO RECALL

recall proceedings there starting mandamus proceedings in the Circuit Court to compel the county clerk to call a recall election on the petitions that have been filed, but that is all moonshine.

New light is, however, thrown upon the case by the following telegram from the attorney general's office at Salem in response to a request for an opinion as to whether names could be withdrawn from a petition, made by Judge Hall:

Salem, Ore., Oct. 29.
District Attorney J. F. Hall, Marshfield, Oregon.

There is no provision for cancelling signatures or amending a petition after the same is filed and becomes a part of the public record. If the petition is insufficient it would be necessary to file a new petition. Mr. Brown is in Pendleton. (Signed) J. A. Benjamin, Assistant Attorney General.

This really went farther than Judge Hall's query, for it appears to cover the case of withdrawing a petition for amendment by the insertion of affidavits, as well as by the withdrawal or insertion of new names. On both these points the attorney general's office takes a position contrary to the opinion furnished County Clerk Oddy by the district attorney. The latter said the petitions could be withdrawn to add the missing affidavits. Mr. Benjamin in effect says they cannot. The district attorney said withdrawals could be filed at any time before the election was ordered. Mr. Benjamin says they cannot.

The possibility that a successful effort to recall Commissioner Phillip can be based on the petitions already filed appear to be infinitely remote. Had County Clerk Oddy received advice that would have warranted him in calling a recall election on the petition that have been filed, an injunction to forbid him from doing so would have been asked at once, and that any court of competent jurisdiction would have held them valid for such a purpose we do not believe.

The fact that most of the signatures failed to give either the number of their precinct or their postoffice address would have probably been fatal. As it is, if any considerable number of qualified electors of Coos county want Mr. Phillip recalled it looks as if they would have to back up and groan.

A. K. Peck Makes Statement.

The word has been passed down to us by our leaders that it is advisable to get aside political strife during the present crisis. I, for one, concur in that view and propose to follow the dictate in deed as well as in word.

There is just one thing which is worth while and that is to win the war. We must have harmony at home to make a solid support for our men in the trenches.

I have not urged my candidacy for the reasons mentioned. But I am making this statement to advise some of my friends who are asking if I have withdrawn, and wondering why I do not buckle on the armor and go into the political arena.

Before the primaries I received a written endorsement from the leading men of my home community for re-election. They endorsed me on the ground that I had made a good record and had received the benefit of one term's experience to better qualify me to serve in the next legislature. It was believed that such experience would be of value in the next session which will undoubtedly be a difficult one.

And I have not withdrawn, and if the voters see fit to re-elect me I shall serve Coos county to the best of my ability.

In the present crisis the demand that every man stay at his job has kept me from meeting the people over the county and I have not spent any time or money on politics. Had Peppermint Jags.

Last Tuesday Joe Morris and Dave Cowan were arrested at Marshfield with good-sized jags on. They had bought 29 bottles of essences and extracts and tonics of various kinds at groceries and drug stores, whose alcoholic content varied from 11 to 25 per cent. They were each fined \$15 and a jail sentence is promised if they repeat the offense.

Any druggist or grocer who knowingly sells tonics or extracts containing a large per cent of alcohol, to individuals for beverage purposes is liable to prosecution, according to the statement by City Attorney Brand in regard to the case.

The Fourth Liberty Loan.

In the First, Second and Third Liberty Loans Coos county averaged in subscriptions 120 per cent of its quota, says the Coos Bay Times.

In the Fourth Liberty Loan as shown by final figures compiled by Dorsey Kreitzer, county chairman, the subscription total of \$901,250 was 124.23 per cent of the quota which was \$725,000. The total number of subscribers was 8768, the largest number in any subscription drive.

The highest average subscription per person subscribing was in the Marshfield district where the average was \$116.22 and the lowest was in Myrtle Point where the average was \$73.53. This indicates that Myrtle Point had a larger proportion of subscribers for the amount secured than in any other district.

Powers went over the quota to the tune of 772.7 per cent with North Bend, the next in line for these honors with 155 per cent. Bandon took lowest place in this barely creeping over the 100 per cent mark.

The various districts and their actual subscriptions as compared with their quotas are given as follows in Mr. Kreitzer's official figures:

Well, father, there is still quite a little doing over here and, believe me, we Yanks are in it up to our necks.

The only thing was when we went after Hiney this time our infantry was not able to run fast enough to keep up with him. Believe me, when our artillery opened up the night before the big rush it was like all hell had turned loose at once. First the big ones from 10 to 20 inch shells began giving Hiney a little hell, then the smaller ones down to the three inch chimed in and sure made it a very unhealthy place for the dutchmen to remain. I was out front where they all passed over my head so can imagine the feeling of those where the shells were landing. The first day our boys went over fifteen kilometers. I received a letter from Mrs. Oerding today and will answer it as soon as I can get a little time. Tell her I have never seen any of the home boys yet since I arrived over here.
