Read Soon to Be Improved.

Hard surfacing of the road from Marshfield to Coquille under the state bonding measure will begin just as early in the spring as possible, was the statement of the state highway commission in session last Friday in Portland, to Charles Hall, president of the Coos County Good Roads association, who was present and made application for the work on the road by the state on the nearest possible date, says the Coos Bay Times. This will mean about March or April it is thought.

Whether the work done by the state will be concrete or macadam, the latter put in with the understanding that it will be surfaced with asphalt, yet is uncertain according to Mr. Hall. It remains to be decided, by Herbert Nunn, state engineer, who had a representative here a few weeks ago collecting data on which the opinion will be based.

Announcement of his decision and of details of carrying out the work in this district will be presented at the next session of the state highway commission which will take place December 10 in Portland.

Both Commissioner Benson and Commissioner Thompson are in favor of concrete instead of macadam with an asphalt covering tater, says Mr. Hall. It is expected this will be their decision. The Good Roads association is opposed to macadamizing with the promise of an asphalt surface later.

By spring when the work under the state bonding measure will start the entire Marshfield-Coquille road will be ready for hard-surfacing if the preparation proceeds as it is now going on.

Make the County the Goat.

At a meeting of the council at Empire Tuesday night, and among other business transacted, an order was passed to pay Dean & Brown \$1400 for the city's part of the expense of building the new road through the city. Coos county has paid \$1530 which together makes the total cost of the road. The road was built on the fifty-fifty plan but overran the estimate \$120 which the county paid, Coos Bay Harbor.

Which leads us to enquire why it is that the county is always the goat when expenses overrun estimates. Why didn't Empire pay half the extra?

Robert Tyrrell on Honor Roll.

J. H. Radabaugh and family received a telegram Saturday, Nov. 23, from Robert S. Tyrrell, of Salida, Cal., informing them of the sad fact that his son, Private Harold H. Tyrrell, of Co. C, 163rd Infantry, A. E. F., was officially reported as missing in action about Aug. 3. He went into training at American Lake Oct. 3, 1917, and was later transferred to Camp Kearney, California. He had only been at the front a very few days, having sailed from New York about June 24. The last letter received from him was dated July 21st, and fears had been entertained for some time of some disaster having befallen him. He lived with his parents near Arago for a number of years, and visited at Mr. Radabaugh's home about a year ago just prior to entering the service of the government.

This news comes as a sad shock to his many friends and relatives, just when all hearts are growing lighter with the close of the war.

We hope against fate that he may, if taken a prisoner, be released in time to return home with his company, which we note is to be demobilized.

While we look forward to the day when the boys come marching home we can not help a feeling of sadness, when we think of the broken ranks that can be filled only by some gallant lad who has sacrificed his life and ambitions and who lies buried "over there," with a wreath of laurels for a headrest and a uniform of khaki for a shroud, but with "Old Glory" waving proudly over all.
