

The Big Man of Marshfield Fire.

Every fire has its outstanding man deserving praise, and the one devastating so much property, early Tuesday morning is no exception to the rule, says the Marshfield Record. That day many people praised the name of Tom Dempsey, one of the veteran loggers of the country, who Monday came to town from Davis Inlet, and to whom Mrs. John Hicks, in whose restaurant the fire started, owes her life.

Mr. and Mrs. Hicks had rooms above the restaurant. Fire was surrounding them when they awoke. Mr. Hicks, excited and almost dazed by smoke, escaped from the burning building, believing Mrs. Hicks was right behind him, and when reaching the ground missed his wife. Some one asked where she was and it was discovered Mrs. Hicks still remained in the burning building. Onlookers, said Tom Dempsey overhearing the conversation, rushed up the flaming stairs, groped in the hall and into two or three rooms before finding Mrs. Hicks. She was unconscious, and through the smoke of the hallway, Mr. Dempsey carried her down the stairs and to the street. There was a little demonstration, as he reached safety, almost overcome but tightly clutching the unconscious woman.

Those who saw the act, said it was one of pure bravery, the rear portion of the roof of the building having collapsed, immediately after Mr. Dempsey emerged from the building.

Christensen Estate Appraised.

The estate of Freddie Christensen, victim of the Dumaru, was appraised at Bandon Friday. It consists of a five acre tract and a three room modern house. Three acres are cleared and leveled. Much work has been done on the place. The house was built as a bachelor quarters and rather of unique design. Some of the windows and doors were brought up by Mr. Christensen from San Francisco, having purchased them at the exposition grounds. As far as is known there are no relatives, but Administrator Chris Rasmussen states that he remembers the deceased having one time spoken of a sister in Denmark. Mr. Rasmussen will endeavor to locate her through the Danish consul at Portland. The estate is appraised at \$900 and unless a relative is found the money will go to the state.—Bandon World.

Spent Much Time in the Hospital

F. E. Drane, of Parkersburg, returned the latter part of last week from a business trip to Reedsport, Gardiner and Portland. On his way home he enjoyed a brief visit with his brother-in-law, A. J. Newton, at Coquille. Mr. Newton has just returned from France, and while he did not get into the real fight there he has many interesting things to tell. He arrived in France on November 6th; on the 9th he took down with the measles and immediately afterwards with the "flu." Most of his time while across was spent in hospitals. Mr. Newton left Parkersburg in the draft in July. He was then employed by Mr. Drane.—Bandon World.

Largest Still Found in Lane.

Powers and Coos county got a good deal of notice because of the still captured in the mountains near Powers and the trial of several men in the federal court. Coos is not alone in the development of stills it seems. Press telegrams from Eugene tell of the finding of the largest still yet discovered in the Willamette valley. The still was found in the mountains three miles northeast of Coburg. H. W. Buckingham and Virgil Glover were arrested. They were caught in the act of destroying the still when found by the officers.—Harbor.
