

These Luxurious French Beds

In a letter dated Romorantin, Loiret-Cher, Dec. 8, 1918, Theodore Easton describes a French bed:

These French beds have all others surpassed, I believe. I have never slept in any that will equal them. A French bed is quite a piece of furniture. It occupies a prominent position in the French home, usually being covered by a canopy hanging from the ceiling, which is draped over the bed, when there are occupants who desire seclusion. In hotels the canopy is absent as a rule, but the general architecture of the bed is the same. The bedstead is a heavy wooden structure, which is built solidly from the floor up. Laid on the bedstead is a high wire bedspring that brings the top of the bed up to about the height of the average American bed. On this is laid a thick mattress, which would make a very comfortable bed placed on the floor, next comes the crowning achievement, a fat feather bed placed on top of the mattress. By this time we have a bed of quite reasonable proportions. It stands higher than any bed I have ever seen in American homes or cities and really looks extraordinarily inviting. It is ready for the covers now. Two sheets and a light cover or two are sufficient. On top of these another feather bed is placed, a small one not very thick and about four feet square, a long pillow, the length of the width of the bed is now rolled under the bottom sheet, and another pillow about two feet square is placed on top. The bed is now ready to crawl into and I find it ready upon my entrance into my chamber. After removing my clothes I make a vault to the top of my bed, crawl between the sheets down under the little feather bed and feel myself sink luxuriously into the downy cushion beneath. I have slept in beds in several French cities, and I have always looked forward in pleasant anticipation to bed time. These French beds, it seems to me, offer the last word in bedcraft. They afford the most complete feeling of comfort I have ever experienced.

Portland Market Report.

Receipts of hogs to date this week 2700 head. The packers were well represented in the hog alleys and prices are showing an advance of 25 cents to 50 making a \$17.50 top.

Hog quotations: Prime mixed \$17.25-17.50; medium mixed \$17.00-17.25; rough heavies \$15.25-15.50; pigs \$13.00-15.00; bulk \$17.25.

Receipts of sheep for the week to date approximately 1000 head. The sheep market is in steady healthy condition and all offerings are readily taken at following quotations.

Prime lambs \$14.00-14.50; fair to medium lambs \$12.00-13.00; yearlings \$10.00-11.00; wethers \$9.00-10.00; ewes \$6.50-8.75.

Still Mining Chrome Ore

A number of men are still laboring diligently getting out chrome ore from the James Keating and Revis Costelloe property located near the headwaters of the North Fork of Smith River, in Curry County, near what is known as the Bald Face creek, says the Crescent City Courier. This mine is under lease to Eastern men who seem to think that there will be a fairly good market for chrome this coming year. Anyway they have sent word to keep at work getting out chrome and are making preparations to start hauling this spring as soon as the weather permits. Coming as this does from authentic information, our people may still have hopes that the chrome industry will be in full swing this year.

Jas. H. Howe to Return Soon

The Bandon World says that a card received from Sergeant Jas. H. Howe, one of its publishers, who is at Astoria Cantonment, Astoria, N. Y., in the Chemical Warfare Service, stated that he expected to start for a coast camp to be mustered out sometime during the latter part of February. He also said that G. A. Gates, the local high school teacher, who left here about the same time in the draft and who has been in the same regiment with Mr. Howe during their entire service, left for Camp Lewis last Tuesday. Mr. Gates' home is in Salem, Oregon.

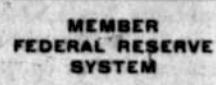
