Letter From Matt Kerrigan

I am still in the army of occupation and sitting tight in a small Dorf, or village, not far from Coblenz. It is sure some — of a place to be put for keeps, as we seem to be, never get a chance to see or do any thing but work. Would rather be back at the front and the war going on, as there is at least a little excitement then. As for my being able to see Germany and Europe please don't kid me. That all reads very nice to the folks at home and helped them become contented, but the only people in this army receiving those privileges are a few officers and the S. O. S. The combat troops never get the chance. If any one tells you he saw Paris and such places put it down he was not a combat soldier or else he is lying.

I would sure like to be back there and have a few of those — slackers pull a strike; believe me, a few of us fellows that gave up everything to come over here while they stay behind and make big wages would like to be turned loose on them the same as we were on these Germans.
