Jackson Is No Joab
Under the heading "No Joab," we find the following in the editorial columns of last Monday's Oregonian:

"An indignant up-state newspaper, the Coquille Sentinel, expresses the interesting conviction that the Portland Journal is the Joab of Oregon journalism. This opinion is based upon recent soapy palaver spread on the up-state newspapers by the Portland publication. Previously it had devised and engineered successfully two initiative measures, one of which reduced below a fair cost the fees litigants must pay small newspapers for legal publications; the other abolished publication of delinquent tax lists. Lately the same newspaper has been telling what a fine service the country newspaper performs for its community and how it is the free packhorse for every worthy enterprise needing publicity. Having done what it could to ruin the country newspapers' business it now proposes that the counties pay them for advertising the victory loan.

"Joab is not one of the biblical character for whom the devout name their promising male offspring. Still he was a great general and performed valiant service for King David. He was a peculiar mixture of courage and cowardice, loyalty and treachery. It is not for these reasons that application of the name to a Portland newspaper seems rather inappropriate but for another, which will be elucidated. The appropriateness of the name is thought by the Sentinel to be found in the story of the murder of Amasa. Joab approached Amasa with words of friendship. He took him by the beard as if to kiss him but smote him with a sword in the fifth rib.

"Joab had previously slain Abner, with whom he had a blood feud, in an almost identical manner. He had engaged in the pursuit of Absalom when the rebellion of David's favorite son collapsed, and although David had admonished his captains to spare Absalom, Joab, when he found Absalom hanging to a tree by his long hair, pierced his heart with darts. It seems to have been because of this incident that David sought to place Amasa in command. Joab's jealousy was the basis of the treachery heretofore related. So it seems that Joab had a mean disposition.

"But so far as scriptural history discloses, Joab at no time after he had killed Abner, Absalom and Amasa went about remarking what fine fellows they were, or what a credit they had been to the community, or how inscrutable were the ways of providence in removing in the full prime of life such sterling citizens and permanent taxpayers, or how an appreciative public ought to chip in for a monument for each of them. It seems to have been Joab's custom to soft-soap his victims before he killed them, not afterward. Not so the Portland newspaper with the country press. Last fall it shook its sword in plain view, frowned horribly, called them gruffers and not till then smote them in the fifth rib. Joab at least had the courage of his convictions. He never, like the Portland newspaper, implied the least sorrow for his foul deeds.

"It is observed that several other newspapers reject the late gentle overtures of the Portland evening paper, among them the Hillsboro Independent and the Medford Mail-Tribune. As encouragement to study the too often neglected scriptures we now propose that all engage in a careful search for a closer biblical comparison than the redoubtable yet treacherous Joab."

Turned Down a Million
The Merriman Baptist Church of Ranger, Texas, although consisting of only twenty-nine members is confronted by a most unique problem. It derives a big income from oil wells drilled on its lands; and is now fighting hard to keep from receiving a million dollars. That is what it is offered for the lease of its cemetery for oil purposes, and some of the members want to take it, but the majority are emphatic in refusing it. In view of the fact that the oil on its land will soon be exhausted by wells drilled around the edge of the cemetery, it seems a short-sighted policy to refuse the million, especially as a very small part of it would buy less desirable ground for a new cemetery and provide for the removal of those laid away in the old one. That they would make no objection to the change is certain.

Call It "Mrs." Sippi
Since we have changed the abbreviation of California from "Cal." to "Calif." in order to avoid confounding it with "Col." the abbreviation of Colorado—and we began doing that in Colorado forty-five years ago—it is suggested that we change "Miss." to "Mrs." in mentioning Mississippi to clearly distinguish it from Missouri. Mississippi is the older state and evidently the school girl abbreviation ought to be applied to the younger one.
