

THREE YEAR PROGRAM FOR MOUTH OF RIVER

The people of this city and all the valley below here who will have to help foot the bills will all be interested in the following article, from the Bandon World, showing what is to be done for the mouth of the Coquille, in the next three years, to enable bigger ships to enter the river:

The greater part of three years is to be consumed in the new Port of Bandon project that is to begin next month, according to the scheme of execution outlined by the government engineers, a copy of which has just been received by Assistant Secretary C. M. Spencer.

The cost of the entire project, one half of which is to be paid by the Port and one-half by the Federal government, is estimated in the preparatory plans at \$127,000.

The program of the work as outlined is as follows:
To make boring survey and exploration with a diver, using Government diving apparatus, to more accurately determine the contours of the bed rock bottom in the entrance channel. The survey to be made in June, 1919, at an estimated cost of about \$2,500.00.

If the bed rock in the entrance channel west of the Lighthouse is sufficiently exposed, it is proposed to carry on surface blasting thereon at points above the project depth of 13 feet during the months of July, August and September. For this work it is proposed to use the Government bucket dredge No. 1 to remove broken rock, and the Government diving apparatus; and to hire a suitable tow boat, scow, small boats, and such other plant as may be necessary. To operate the plant with a force consisting of one surveyor, blasting foreman, diver, powder man and a crew of about 6 or 8 hands as may be necessary. It is estimated that for labor, purchase of explosives and supplies, and hire of additional plant, about \$7,000 per month can be profitably expended for 3 months in 1919, \$21,000.00.

To transfer the Government pipe line dredge, "Oregon," and equipment from Coos Bay to the mouth of the Coquille River about July 1, 1920, at an estimated cost of about \$3,000.

To operate the dredge "Oregon" by hired labor for about 3 months, double shift, in removing 200,000 cubic yards of sand between the jetties at an estimated cost of \$7,000 per month, \$21,000.

To continue surface blasting and subaqueous rock removal in the entrance channel west of the Lighthouse, where practicable, with the same plant and crew as used in 1919, during the month of June, July, August and September, 4 months at \$7,000 per month for labor, purchase of explosives and other supplies, and for the rent of plant, \$28,000.

To carry on the work of subaqueous rock removal in the entrance channel to the east of the Lighthouse, using as plant the Government bucket dredge No. 1, fitted with Government steam drill, Government diving apparatus, and hired tow boat, scows, and small boats, as may be necessary. The plant to be operated by hired labor during the four months of June, July, August and September, at an estimated cost for labor, explosives, and supplies, and rent of additional plant, of \$7,250 per month, \$10,000.00.

In addition to the foregoing the estimate contains an aggregate of \$22,500 for contingencies, overhead etc. This is 20 per cent of the whole amount. The project will be done under the jurisdiction of the government engineers, Portland office.

The road districts anticipate no trouble in securing the special tax levies which will be paid in the Southern Oregon tax money. These special taxes total about \$50,000. The organization will attempt to secure a part of the general road taxes also.

These however, are only the immediate objects of the association which will draw up a road improvement program providing development to make the Coos Bay Wagon Road through the Pacific highway one of the best of the trunk lines of the big highway.

At present the resources of the country and a general road improvement are being listed for the action planned by the association.

It is expected that 500 members will be signed up. Douglas county people on the road will form a similar organization it is hoped.

The Summer transportation company claims to have doubted the business brought in from the Brewster valley country in the past month and holds the possibilities are even greater. A truck line and an auto stage line to Roseburg would be put on as soon as the road could be developed, it is stated.
