saying it was evidently time that the more intelligent sex should be represented in this position, placed Mrs. Laura Brandon in nomination. Although Mrs. B. promptly stated that she could not accept the position her withdrawal was not noted and a motion to close the nominations with no candidate before the meeting was entertained by the chairman and was about to be put when Mrs. Brandon checked the motion by again declaring she could not serve and the motion was then withdrawn. J. S. Lawrence was then nominated to succeed himself as clerk and Keith Leslie was also nominated. It being announced that Mr. Leslie would be away and could not serve made a motion that the chairman cast ballot for the meeting to re-elect Mr. Lawrence was made by A. J. Sherwood and it was carried unanimously.

By this time the tellers were ready to report on the two-year term which stood 197 for Endicott and 231 for Morrison. This announcement was greeted with hearty applause.

In ten or fifteen minutes more the other tellers had completed their work, showing 209 votes for True and 221 for Ellingsen, when with another round of cheers the meeting adjourned.

It was, of course, generally understood at the meeting that Candidates Morrison and Ellingsen were not only in favor of erecting a new school building as soon as possible, but also of compromising the site case which has been a bone of contention and most of the time in the courts for the past five years, if it could be done at a reasonable figure, and it was on this issue that the voters divided. While Candidates True and Endicott favored building also, on the site question they expected to go on with the litigation unless directed to do otherwise.

Of course, no action of any kind by the new board will be possible until his return.

The District Clerk's Report

The annual report of the district was read by Mr. Lawrence at the school meeting Monday evening and accepted by the voters. From it we glean the following items:

The number of children in the district of school age is 525, which is 22 less than last year. There are 243 boys and 282 girls, the excess of girls being 39, where it was 45 last year, quite a number of boys between 16 and 20 being in the service then and probably some still remaining now.

The number of teachers employed during the year was 13, two of them men and eleven women, with 14 rooms in operation during the year. School was taught for nine months during the year. The number of legal voters in the district is estimated at 700.

There are 1200 volumes in the school library, of which 50 were purchased during the year. Some seem to have been scrapped during the year as, notwithstanding additions, the total remains the same as a year ago.

The amount of warrants outstanding is \$5,217.775. The amount of bonded indebtedness is \$1,619.40. The estimated value of school house and grounds is \$16,000, and of school furniture \$6,250. Insurance on the district property is carried to the amount of \$13,000.

The average monthly salary of men teachers was \$130 and of women \$79.55.

Coos Bay Creamery Burns

The Coos Bay Creamery on Coos river took fire Monday afternoon, probably from a defective flue, and was entirely destroyed. There was a large amount of cheese in storage some of which was saved. It was being operated by A. A. Christensen, of Myrtle Point.

The plant would cost about \$20,000 to replace and the value of the contents is thought to exceed \$15,000. There was \$5,000 insurance on the building and \$10,500 on its contents.
