Wake Up About the Highway

Oregon is not following up the Roosevelt highway program since voting the bond issue and putting the project before the government. This is the message L. J. Simpson, who is in Washington as a representative of the Pacific Coast Safety league and the coast counties in behalf of the highway, sent to George Quayle, secretary of the State Chamber of Commerce Monday.

Mr. Simpson, accompanied by Charles Hall of Marshfield, president of the state chamber, and Ben F. Jones of Tillamook, representative of the reconstruction committee, went to Washington last week in the interest of the highway measure. The message sent by Mr. Simpson is the words of 31 three men, and they make an appeal for Portland and the entire state to awaken to the need of support.

"Oregon gave support to the measure at the referendum early in June, and seems to have forgotten that support from the government in assuming half the expense of building of the road is just as vitally necessary if the people of the state really want the road," said Mr. Quayle.

The message from Mr. Simpson is being sent broadcast over the state to various commercial organization and has been given to every member of the Portland chamber. It is as follows:

"Please have the state chamber and the Portland Chamber of Commerce and as many influential citizens of the state as possible wire the Oregon delegation to use their best efforts in the support of appropriations for the Roosevelt highway. We do not believe this measure is receiving serious consideration. Words of support will help materially at this time.

They Have Full Authority

Attorney General Brown in a recent opinion says that county agricultural agents in Oregon are acting entirely within their authority in mixing poisons, preparing poison baits and distributing the same to the public for the purpose of exterminating rodents, according to the provisions of the law passed by the recent legislature which takes precedence over any prior statutes bearing on this subject.

In fact, he holds that it is the duty of county agents to enforce the provisions of the statutes when these provisions have been accepted by the county court or the board of county commissioners.

Not long ago, Gov. Slade, of Vermont, sent off a large number of young ladies to Oregon as teachers, putting them under bonds of \$500 each not to get married within a year after their arrival. We judge, however, from the following paragraph that they will be very likely to break those bonds for the purpose of assuming others:

The Oregon land bill makes every lady worth \$20 acres, if taken by December next, so that the inducements to get married more than counterbalance the fine imposed. They have created a great sensation among the unmarried Oregonians, and it is predicted that, unless a new supply is immediately dispatched thitherward, the territory will be without teachers. That will, however, not be a very great deprivation as all the next generation will find teachers in their mothers.

To Get Sand from River Bed

F. E. Drane and A. McLeod of Bandon have been given a contract by Dean & Brown to supply 10,000 yards of Coquille river sand for use in mixing concrete for the Marshfield-Coquille highway. The sand will be scooped out of the river at a point opposite the Gallier Hotel in Bandon. Scows will be used to transport the sand to Cedar Point where it will be placed in bunkers and loaded onto flat cars or trucks as the contractors may later determine. The contract calls for 120 yards daily throughout the summer.
