BRYAN IN COOS COUNTY

for the dry cause and the democratic line to one. That the nation would soon become dry in fact as well as in name, he was sure now that the only way to find a place where liquor could legally be sold, was to wade out beyond one's depth to the three mile limit.

He spoke of the conversion of breweries into other industries and said the greatest conversion was in Minnesota, where the Methodists had taken over a property and were making of it a community center.

He also referred to the conversion of one at Salem in this state into a loganberry juice factory. Mr. Bryan said that America is going to convert her world to temperance, because it had a dual remedy—total abstinence and prohibition. The speaker said that although he is 59 years of age, he expects to live to see the time that there will not be an open saloon under any flag of a civilized nation.

Among the many problems referred to by the speaker was that of good roads, and along that line he showed what might be done by using the amount this country used to spend for drink on the highways. Our drink bill was \$2,500,000,000. Taking the length of this country east and west as 3,000 miles in round numbers and its width north and south at 1000, a little computation showed that allowing the very liberal figure of \$25,000 as the cost of paving one mile of road, in three years that drink bill would be enough to give us paved roads every twenty miles both north and south and east and west. This seemed so extravagant a claim that we were from Missouri, and had to be shown, but it took very few figures to show that it worked out exactly that way.

Speaking of the problem of finding work for the returned soldiers, Mr. Bryan paid a great tribute to the American soldier in the world war. He said that the very fact that our soldiers had been protected against both drink and disease had made it possible to train them in a shorter time than an army had ever been trained before so that in four months they were sent overseas. While in other wars a large percentage of the soldiers had been rendered useless by preventable diseases up to 70 per cent in some instances, among our boys this depletion was reduced to one-fourth of one per cent, showing that trouble of this kind was only one-seventh hundredth as prevalent as it used to be.

He said the returned soldiers should be given a chance to go back to their former positions, that public work should be provided for them, and those not able to work because of wounds should be given proper vocational training, that they might take their places in the world as useful citizens not dependent upon charity for a living. "Our country must do the brave boys justice," he said.

"Another immediate need is the protection of the country from the profiteer," said the speaker, "for while our boys were giving their blood abroad the people at home were being bled by profiteers. He favored local trade commissions that will deal with all problems of such character.

Private monopoly vs. government ownership came in for considerable discussion, the speaker leaving no doubt as to his position when he declared for the latter, saying that if the government could make a success of the postoffice business, it could of the telegraph and railroads. He does not favor the government ownership of telephone lines, except as relates to long distance lines, saying that he favors the local exchanges being owned by the cities, as conditions covering them are purely local.

As to the railroads he favored a dual plan, his democratic state rights theories evidently making him shy at any needless increase of the powers of the national government that could be avoided. He would have the main trunk lines government owned and the rest state owned. Every argument in favor of continuing the system of private ownership of railroads, was fully met and answered by showing that if the government didn't control them they would ultimately control the government. His primary proposition was that a monopoly was indefensible and intolerable; and that in the nature of things public utilities, telephones, water plants and lighting plants were unavoidably monopolies.

Declaring that the League of Nations and peace treaty were the biggest problems before the people right now, he believed the president's argument unanswerable. The first question before the American people is whether they want peace or war, and the League of Nations, said Mr. Bryan, breathes the spirit of the Prince of Peace. The second question is whether the League of Nations is calculated to bring the world to that point where there will be no more war.

He further said that he was against it because he is opposed to this nation being yoked to an inferior nation, because America is a disinterested nation and is only fighting and standing for the world's safety.

He emphasized again and again that America occupied a position different from that of any other nation, especially in that it gave to the world the idea of the League of Nations, and must stand on the side to give right and justice to every nation, but it cannot do it if it has an alliance with any nation. Then, too, the speaker said, he was not willing to take from the American congress the power to declare war and place it in the hands of a French assembly, and if ever that power was to be taken away from the senate, it should rest with the Amer-
