

**AASEN AND PAULSEN  
OPEN NEW LUMBER CAMP**

A new logging camp will be opened on the North Fork of Coos river, just above Allegany, within the next 30 days, which will take out timber owned by J. E. Paulsen, of Coquille, and J. L. Aasen, of Coquille, one of the most successful logging camp operators in this part of the state.

Yesterday one of the two derrick engines which is to be used in the camp, arrived by freight and today it will be taken to the Kruse & Banks yards to be reloaded on a scow for the trip up the river. For the past few weeks a dam has been under construction and by the close of another month operation can start, states J. L. Aasen yesterday on his arrival here to look over business matters connected with the new camp.

About 25 men will be employed in the camp and there is sufficient timber for two years continuous cutting. Fir will comprise most of the output. The camp location is just above Allegany.

The logs will be put on the open market and local mills have already put in bids for the output, it is learned.

The timber to be logged belongs to Mr. Paulsen and Mr. Aasen, it is stated, and has been pooled for the operations.

Mr. Aasen is of Aasen brothers, who have had camps in the Coquille valley country and who were extensively engaged during the war in operations for the Sika Spruce company of Coquille, one of the biggest spruce producing mills in the northwest. More recently Mr. Aasen has been actively engaged with the Aasen & Schroeder mill, which is cutting lumber near Coquille. There is much satisfaction that so able an operator has opened a camp on this side of the county. Mr. Paulsen was extensively engaged in lumbering operations during the period of the war and his connection with the operation is regarded as assuring a large success.—Coos Bay Times.

**To Study Our Geology**

Dr. Warren D. Smith, head of the department of geology of the university left last week for a five weeks' trip to Douglas county, where he will do some work respecting the geological characteristics of the territory between Roseburg and Myrtle Point. He will be accompanied by Hubert Schenck, who will enter the university in the fall to assist in the geology department. Mr. Schenck has just been released from duty as instructor in the school at Fortness Moore, Virginia.—Eugene Register.

**More Cow Testing Needed**

J. E. James arguing in the Marshfield city council in favor of cow testing for tuberculosis, quoted J. L. Mason, a veterinarian at Myrtle Point, as saying that two deaths in the county could be proven to have come from bovine tubercular conditions and that tests were not extensive. That tests were not carried out was doubted by Mayor Ferguson and other councilmen, who said that this was required by the state and that the testing associations regularly tested all cows.

**Denio's Wire Work in Curry**

Supt. Lon Denio, of the Southern Curry Telephone company, had a crew of men at work brushing out the line from Port Orford south last week. The wire is now in first class shape up that way. Mr. Denio says it is probable that the line from Euchre creek to Gold Beach, which now follows the coast road, will be removed to the Cedar Fork route before winter.—Gold Beach Reporter.

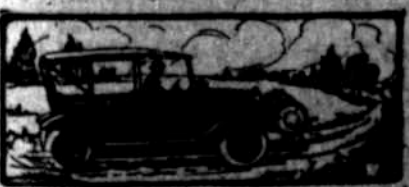
**Ride on Rubber Now**

Folks out my way who never see any timber except that in the railroad folders are simply knocked out of their feet when they are taken out into your gigantic forests, but they quickly see the possibilities and are willing to stake a wad on their judgment."

**Tail-Tale Blood Stains**

A. M. Riley Pinkerton detective who had been investigating the Long-theft murder case here, has completed his work and filed his results with the officials. It is understood that he has found some additional evidence against Harold Howell, the boy held for the murder. The trousers and shoes worn by the boy on the day of the crime are said to now be in possession of the officers. Blood spots were found made by the fingers in pulling up the trousers at the belt. These will be analyzed and compared with the spots on the girl's clothing. Blood spots have also been detected on the stock of the gun.—Bandon World.

**Bandon Won't Rebate**
