

**NOT ONLY BEARS**

**ON THE BEACH**

Here is a news dispatch from Phoenix, Arizona, that must be a little surprising to residents of Coos and Curry counties:

When orthodox Jews celebrate the Feast of Tabernacles next October it is likely that all, no matter in what part of the country they live, will come into indirect contact with Phoenix. The prescribed ceremonies of the feast involve the shaking of a bunch of myrtle by each member of the congregation. This year the myrtle probably will come from Phoenix. What are said to be the only myrtle plants in America, outside of hot-houses, grow in the Phoenix section. Many grow on the grounds of the state capital. Recently Rabbi S. Lewis applied to the state authorities for permission to gather and sell the trimmings taken from these plants by the gardeners. The trimmings heretofore have been thrown away.

While no action has been taken on the application, it is reported that it will be granted and that, as a result, between 20,000 and 25,000 of the clippings will be sent from here this fall.

We shouldn't have to depend on garden trimmings for myrtle boughs. This county could supply enough for the Jews of the world and not miss them. Phoenix need not preen herself so haughtily.

**Two Clam Shell Dredgers**

Drane & McLeod have installed two clam-shell dredgers to handle the work of furnishing Coquille river gravel for the Marshfield-Coquille road work. The machinery was purchased of Henry Ansell, who bought it from Sam Frenschmans recently. With the new equipment Messrs. Drane & McLeod find that they can supply gravel faster than the road contractors can use it and so have taken additional orders for stones. They are now also supplying material for concrete work on the streets at North Bend. One of the dredgers is used to dig the gravel and place it on scows at Bandon, and the other is used to unload it from the scows onto the cars at Cedar Point.—Bandon World.

**Coyotes a Big Menace**

Alex Turner, owner of a 250-acre stock ranch lying between Florida creek and Four Mile, south of Bandon, was in town on business. According to Mr. Turner the coyote menace has made the sheep and goat industry of his section a bit precarious. As an illustration he mentioned 20 kids born on his ranch last year, the number living to an age capable of protecting themselves being four. The others were killed by coyotes and bobcats. The hill lands are ideal for sheep and goat ranges, he states, if the coyotes and cats can be eliminated. The first coyotes noticed in this section appeared about five or six years ago.—Bandon World.

**Death of Arnold W. Haberly**

Arnold Warren Haberly, the 18-year old son of Rev. A. Haberly, who was formerly pastor of the Presbyterian church here, died at Albany where he was attending Albany College, August 8. His father, who is now pastor of a Presbyterian church at Hoxie, Kansas, arrived just before his death and his mother came the following day. The deceased was living with a sister at Albany and among the ten children are also Mrs. O. H. Aasen, of Arago, and Mrs. E. C. McAllister, of Coquille.

**Big Barn in Lake Region**

H. D. Smoak came in from Ada where he has just finished building a barn for F. T. Gilpatrick, which so far as we know, is the largest in Lane county west of the coast mountains. The barn is 96 feet long, 64 feet wide and 38 feet from the peak of the roof to the ground. Three men worked four months and used 65,000 feet of lumber in building it.—Florence West.

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**Some Dogs Worth While**

Last week the Tribune had an item to the effect that Will Coy, of Eucha creek, had come up to the Robt. Fromm ranch with his dogs about a bear that was killing sheep on the latter's ranch, and that the bear was started but got away. The latter part of the item was a mistake. The bear was started all right, and it and the dogs got out of the hearing the hunters. It was thought they headed towards the Eucha or Lehoter creek country, and search was made for them in that direction without avail. Two days later, Mrs. C. H. Pearce, at Middle Elk, heard dogs barking and telephoned to the Fromm home and when Mr. Fromm arrived on the scene he found the dogs at the foot of the tree where they had been for more than 48 hours, and the bear which was a big black one, was in the tree.

Mr. Coy usually gets from 10 to 15 bear a year with these dogs, and no doubt the reason they stayed at this tree so long is that he always goes to them even though it may mean laying out over night in a winter storm without food or blankets. He was still securing the woods, and it was welcome news to him this time when he heard they had been found all right with their game.—Port Orford Tribune.
