Coquille Post Takes Stand For Law and Order and Community Patriotism

The local post of the American Legion furnishes official copies of the following sets of patriotic resolutions just adopted here:

Be it resolved, That Coquille Post No. 36, American Legion, in regular meeting assembled, unanimously adopts the following resolutions, and directs that one copy be spread upon the minutes of the meeting of this Post, and that other copies of the same be forwarded to the public press for publication:

Whereas, By public proclamation of the President of the United States, and of the Governor of the State of Oregon, Tuesday, the 11th day of November, A. D. 1919, was proclaimed a public holiday, requesting all patriotic American citizens to fittingly observe the same as the day commemorating the glorious victory for World's peace and liberty, and

Whereas, A due obedience of the proclamation was had in every city and village in our land, by a fitting observance of the same, by the closing of all stores and other places of business, by the patriotic demonstration of all kinds and classes of citizens; that, with few exceptions, the merchants of this city refused to close their shops, and from all appearances had entirely forgotten the first principles of patriotism and citizenship; therefore

Be it Resolved, that we, the members of Coquille Post No. 36, American Legion, in regular meeting assembled, do express our most sincere thanks and appreciation for the patriotism and loyalty of the following firms whose places of business were closed during the hours of the celebration: Fuhrman's Pharmacy, Lund's Toggery, E. S. Knowlton Drug Co., Willey & Son;

And be it further Resolved, that Coquille Post No. 36 be placed on record favoring the strict observance of all National and State holidays, to the end that true American patriotic demonstrations shall not give way to sordid commercialism and financial greed.

That whereas, in the city of Centralia, Washington, several of our comrades have been murdered in cold blood, through a propaganda, too long tolerated by a patient and peace loving people, which has brought most forcibly to us a full realization of the lawlessness and wanton depravity of this red menace, which must now be stamped out and banished forever from our shores, therefore

Be it hereby Resolved, that we, the members of Coquille Post No. 36 of the American Legion in regular meeting assembled, do hereby express our sincere sympathy and heartfelt condolence to the relatives and friends of our deceased comrades, who, in peaceful celebration of that great day for which we all suffered and fought, were cold-bloodedly murdered at the hands of cowardly assassins; and

Be it further Resolved, that we sustain, and stand ready and willing at all times to assist our comrades in any steps they may take to rid our Country of this lawless, seditious, and wantonly destructive rabble which seeks to disrupt society, overthrow our Government, and to destroy that for which our forefathers, our fathers and we, ourselves, have striven and fought to maintain—our homes, our country and our flag.

Temperament and Watch.

That particular kind of temperament exercises a baleful influence on watches seems to be a common experience.

"I once carried four in three months," writes a correspondent, "and all stopped. A watchmaker told me that they behaved as watches do when the spring of the balance gets magnetized, though why they should have done so he could not say."

The fact when mentioned to Prof. Sylvanus Thompson, distinguished electrician, noticed that the clock-stopper suggested a good deal, and ventured to suggest that such movements probably generated a small amount of frictional electricity at high tension, which might at times magnetize the spring.
