About that Service Medal
The American Legion requests the Sentinel to publish the following extract from Chapter 382 of the laws of Oregon for 1919, which provides for "a medal to be presented to Oregon's soldiers, sailors, marines and other persons entering the military and naval service of the United States since the commencement of the United States' participation in the world war, and honorably discharged therefrom, and to arrange for the distribution of such medals among the persons entitled thereto." It is requested that any soldier, sailor or marine, whether a member of the American Legion or not, in order to get complete list of those entitled to medal, present data at once to Walter F. Oerding, Commander, American Legion, Coquille Post No. 36.

Difference of Opinion
Doctors differ as to whether the return epidemic now prevailing all over the country is the Spanish Influenza that took such a toll of death a year ago, or merely the grip which is with us every year. The present attack is not only much milder than a year ago but is said to differ radically in its symptoms from that deadly epidemic. We have heard of only three cases in Coquille so far, and one of them was a recent arrival from the east. In this case the difference of opinion among physicians was evident, the city health officer putting up a quarantine sign, which the county health officer removed.

Very encouraging reports are coming from the investigation of the mineral deposits discovered in the Langlois and Denmark neighborhoods two or three months ago, says the Port Orford Tribune. Some of the assays returned have shown starting values, the plantinum alone running as high as 16 and 18 ounces per ton of ore.

Parties said to be representing San Francisco smelting works, where some of the rock was sent for analysis, have been in the Langlois section during the past week and several of the local people were offered \$5,000 each for their claims. E. B. Sypher gave a 90 day option to sell the mineral rights on his ranch for \$15,000.

Such facts as the above tend to show that a rich mineral deposit has been found and its scope is so large, the ledge having been traced for several miles, that it will not be surprising if the near future sees mining development in northern Curry on a scale heretofore undreamed of.
