(b) Best yield. .20

(c) Best profit on investment. .20

(d) Completeness and accuracy of report. .10

Possible score. .100

Potato Project

\$25.00 For best peck of potatoes grown from at least one-tenth of an acre patch by any boy or girl in the district. \$25.00

Basis of Awards points

(a) Best peck of potatoes exhibited 50

(b) Best yield from 1-10 acre. .20

(c) Best profit on investment. .20

(d) Completeness and accuracy of report. .10

Possible score. .100

Requirements of the Contest

(1) All boys and girls between the ages of 9 and 18 inclusive at the close of the contest are eligible for entry in one or more of these projects.

(2) Unless there are at least twenty-five entries in each contest in the district the amount of the cash prize will be reduced one dollar for each entry less than the required number.

(3) Work of all projects must be conducted according to printed instructions issued from the Club Department at O. A. C. and the Coos County Agent's office at Coquille.

Gold Medals for Grand Prizes

After the results of the contest have been exhibited and prizes awarded at a community fair or show in each district, the prize winners in each project from the three districts shall all be assembled for exhibit at the big annual Coos Show at Coquille, where they will all compete for the gold medals as the grand prizes for the championship of the county.

Clubs

Owing to the fact that Coos has no regular County Club Leader this year it may take some time to get a club started in your community; but do what you can to get one organized by talking with your parents, your teacher, your County Agent and your State Club Leader at O. A. C. If you are interested send in your name at once.

No boy or girl will be barred from a chance to win one of these prizes if they happen to live in a community where there is no regular organized club.

Now is the time to make arrangements to secure your calf; to get the eggs to set your hen, or to purchase a dozen day old chicks, or to get your ground prepared and the seed to plant your patch of spuds. Do it now.

Canary Grass Seed From Farm Business

About thirty pounds of Canary Grass seed has been left at the Farmers and Merchants Bank for distribution in small amounts at \$5.00 per lb. to good, honest, hardworking, reliable and righteous ranchers who will agree to take this precious and sacred seed and sow it on good soil.

Anyone who has seen this wonderful grass growing in the Coquille Valley knows that no matter how wet or how dry the weather, it is always green and makes fine pasture and enormous yields of hay. The seed from this grass is in great demand. Inquiries have been received for it from many parts of the U. S. but there is not nearly enough for the farmers even here in this county.

We have endeavored to locate seed of this Canary Grass through the Farm Crops Department at O. A. C., the U. S. Department of Agriculture and from various seed companies throughout the land but with no success.

Here is an opportunity for Coos county to become famous by producing more of this great grass. So far only about a dozen farms here have any of it growing to any extent, but everyone is trying to get a little seed to sow. The oldest seeding of it here in the county was started about fifteen years ago or more. The grass is a perennial and is especially adapted to low bottom land. About 6 or 7 lbs. of seed are required per acre.

If you are lucky enough to secure a pound of this seed you may get a little patch started and perhaps you may have some seed to sell some day.

Get your request in at once if you want a pound, for we predict there will be an awful run on the bank for this scarce seed which seems to be worth its weight in gold.
