Home Demonstration Work.

Making housework easier for the women of Coos county is the aim of the Oregon Agricultural College, working through its home demonstration agent, says a letter from Corvallis.

Dress forms are a favorite topic of discussion with their agent. Forms of plaster of paris and paper-mache are made. The problem of the made-over dress has been discussed, and lessons have been given in fitting commercial patterns. Schools have been held at Bandon, Coquille, Catching Inlet, Coos River and Lakeside, lectures being given by women trained for work in nutrition and clothing. Babies were measured, and talks on infants' diets and the value of hot lunches for school children made.

Definite work has been done by the demonstration agent in 10 places and 14 communities have been visited once or more. Clubs having regular officers have been organized, and some have admitted men as honorary members. Dew Valley has organized a woman's part of the Farm Bureau. The Bridge, Broadbent, Norway and Arago clubs put on exhibits at the county fair. At Coquille the demonstration agent has been working with the Woman's Club in its efforts to establish a community building.

Two circulating libraries have been placed in the county through the efforts of Miss Minnie Kalbus, the home demonstration agent. During the clean-up campaign she talked at the local theaters. She has co-operated with the county nurse in the interests of the babies. Through her efforts in one community a club was organized, and this club has now built a community house containing a large playroom for the children in the basement. This assistance is being given through public and home demonstrations, personal conferences, lectures, publications, correspondence, and otherwise.
