COOS COUNTY LIVE STOCK SHOW.

The Coos County Livestock Show proved to be such a splendid success that plans are already under way to make this a permanent institution for Southern Oregon and include all classes of livestock.

Professor E. B. Fitts of the Oregon Agricultural College passed upon all classes of dairy cattle, swine, sheep, and hogs and several times in judging the dairy classes complimented the breeders on the real quality evidenced by the type of individuals they were leading into the first livestock show ring of its nature ever held in Southern Oregon. All classes of dairy cattle were represented excepting the Ayrshire. Professor Fitts placed the awards as follows:

Jersey Bulls two years old and over: Finley Schroeder on St. Mawes Tisha Waltz; W. C. Cutler, Myrtle Point, second on Silkies St. Mawes; Chas. V. Peterson and Algie Hanson of Haynes Inlet on Oregon Maple Park Chief H.

Jersey Bulls under one year: George Hampton of Arago first; C. D. Jarman of Bullards second, and H. B. Sander of Catching Inlet third.

Jersey cows two years old and over: J. D. Carl of Arago first Schroeder Bros of Arago, second and C. D. Jarman of Bullards, third.

Jersey heifers one year old and under two: R. M. Bunn of Arago first, George Hampton of Arago second, and Chas. Kime & Son of Coquille third.

Jersey senior calves: W. C. Cutler of Myrtle Point first, J. L. Smith of Coquille, second; V. H. Berkey, Lee, third.

Jersey Junior calves: W. C. Cutler of Myrtle Point, first, Hervey Bros. of Lee, second and Elbert Davis of Bandon, third.

Finley Schroeder of Norway took champion male and J. D. Carl of Arago took championship female with Lass Silken of Cedar Home.

Holstein Bulls two years old and over: L. J. Simpson, Shoreacres, first; H. W. Walker of Cooston, second; J. Larson, third.

Holstein bulls over one and under two years: Geo. E. Dix, Coos River, first; H. H. Haynes, Isthmus Slough, second; F. E. Rogers, Coos River, third.

Holstein bulls under one year: Geo. E. Dix, first, L. J. Simpson, second. Champion bull went to L. J. Simpson of Shoreacres on a son of Matador Segis Walker.

Holstein females two years old and over: Geo. E. Dix, first.

Heifers over one year and under two years: George Gunnell of Catching Inlet, first and Geo. E. Dix of Coos River, second; A. O. Kjelland, third.

Championship female went to Geo. E. Dix of Coos River on Mea Merillas Dekol 4th.

The Coos County Infirmary took a blue ribbon with Snowdrops Khe-dive of Rose City, a nine months old Guernsey bull calf, pronounced by the judge to be a splendid individual of the breed.

Puzzle of the "Seven Seas."
