### Council Meeting Wednesday

After adjourning Tuesday night for lack of a quorum, the council met Wednesday evening at 8:30 with four councilmen and the mayor present.

They were waited on by a committee of property owners, Geo. Ward, Orval Smith, Mrs. Hattie Bledsoe and W. A. Ireland, who asked that a road be improved by making a small fill across the gulch up there so that access could be had to the city park.

They were not fully determined as to the best route, but suggested for one way that the improvement begin at the northeast corner of the school house on Third street and run east for a couple of blocks and then due north to the park. Another suggestion was that the improvement begin at the Jas. Noeler corner running three or four blocks east on Fourth street and then north on Division street to the park. They were not much in favor of the route selected by a committee of the council as a possible approach to the park. This route would be on Fifth street, starting at the fill on Taylor and running east under the north end of the Henry street bridge to the park. One thing in favor of that street would be the slight grade encountered in making an air line road from the highway to the park.

It was finally decided that the committee—Councilmen Barrow, Skeels and Mansell—the city engineer and the property owners interested should meet Sunday morning at 11 o'clock and look over all possible approaches to the park with a view to improving a street to it which would be the most satisfactory from every point of view.

The North End improvement was laid over for this summer at least, or until the price of material and the cost of doing the work comes down.

R. H. Mast, representing Mrs. J. L. Thompson, asked for information concerning the concrete walks along the block in which the Sentinel is located. The two pieces of walk do not jibe by about five feet. Mr. Gould explained that in this section of the city all sidewalks are, according to the ordinance, to be laid in from a line ten feet out from the property line. Then where a ten foot walk is desired the curb line will be straight. In the case of the block in question it would undoubtedly have been better to have laid subsequent walks in conformity to the first concrete walk laid and thus have prevented the ugly jog which will always exist in the middle of this block to the east unless the walk along the Sentinel building should be moved out five feet with the consequent destruction of a fine lot of trees.

A petition from all the property owners on Hall street from Second to the brow of the hill at the Chase barn, was read to the council asking that the grade from Third street north be changed to make it conform to the present lay of the ground and that the street be improved with a concrete pavement 16 feet wide, and that concrete walks be ordered along all property on the street. With this unanimous request backing them up, the council instructed the city engineer to prepare plans, specifications and estimates for the improvement desired and to make the necessary changes in the established grade.

Bringing up the water question and the absolute necessity of using Dutch John water during the dry season, Mayor Johnson stated that a chlorinator for purifying the water there could be installed for \$700, to which it was sarcastically added by a councilman, "The people will go crazy if we put chemicals in the water."

Samples from this stream have been sent out again to the State Board of Health, and there is still talk of sending samples from the North Fork.

Mrs. Bledsoe objected to a portion of the T bridge being closed, but was informed that any repairs on that structure could be only temporary and
