Mrs. E. B. Finley, who has been visiting relatives in Salem, returned last Friday.

Little Verna Halter, who is down with typhoid fever, is getting along nicely. She is the third one in the family to have it this summer.

Miss Martha Wilkinson, of Grants Pass, who will teach our next term of school, was up viewing the school house and surroundings Saturday. She was accompanied by her sister, who will teach the seventh and eighth grades in Coquille.

This scribber has just returned from a three weeks' visit to relatives in Salem and while there she visited most all the institutions, among them the Old People's Home. There are 18 inmates, ten ladies and three gentlemen. We enjoyed visiting with them. They expressed themselves as being well treated and said they were just like one big family. One dear old lady asked me if I knew the editor of the Sentinel. She said to tell him she was fine and she sent him and his family her best love. Her name is Mrs. Johnson, better known as Aunt Vie.

We also visited the T. B. Sanitarium and saw Elbert Culbertson, of Bandon. He seemed to be getting along fine and said he was feeling better. We also saw W. M. Nicholas, of North Bend, who said he was about the same as when he went there two years ago.

We went through both the main building and the cottage farm of the asylum; then the pen; through the Home for the Weak Minded; and the Training school for boys. All seem to be every thing they are supposed to be.

Dr. Smith, superintendent of the Home for the Feeble Minded, took great interest in showing us over all the building. He said, "This institution belongs to the people and they

have a right to see and know how things are run here." Any one could see the inmates dearly love him; the smaller ones run to him and hug his legs till he can hardly walk. Sanitation is visible everywhere. There are 617 inmates in the eight buildings. The grounds comprise 635 acres of land where they raise all their vegetables. They bake bread four or five times a week and use 12 to 15 sacks of flour at each baking. Yes, it was by far the largest oven I ever saw.

Orion is caring in the front when it comes to curing for L. I. unfortunately and I don't think anyone need to worry about their dear ones there while Dr. Smith is in charge.

Mrs. Morrell is the matron and she, too, won a warm spot in our heart for the love and kindness she showed those children.

The cottage farm of the asylum is another feature worthy of mention. It is six miles out of town. Mrs. Hofen, the matron, showed us over the buildings and we were glad to see how well these unfortunates are provided for. Mr. Simpson is superintendent of this branch. There are 1400 acres of land, nine large buildings, one horse barn, one cow barn, one hog house. They milk from 60 to 90 cows and keep about 3500 chickens. There are seven wards with from 25 to 60 patients to a ward and 300 inmates. Thirty men and ten women are employed.

The number of inmates now in the insane asylum are 1121 males and 640 females. There are 270 men and one woman now in the pen, which has 337 cells. There 150 boys in the training school, which has a farm of 400 acres, of which 320 are under cultivation. They milk 25 to 30 cows. It seems as if they are doing all they can to make the boys better. Some were making shoes, some washing, some ironing, some making clothes, some practicing music, some canning corn; all seemed to be busy and all would have looked better to me at home helping their mother.

Salem is a beautiful town and what impressed us most was its wonderful roads, the state buildings and their grounds; but still there are places in Salem we would rather be here than there. I write this for those who have unfortunate loved ones and can't go there and see what I have had the privilege of seeing.
