Fire Warden's News

Fire Warden J. M. Thomas was a caller the first of the week. No matter what position he holds, Mr. Thomas always has some information for the newspapers. He says that the past summer has seen no damage from fire in the big timber, the ground and undergrowth remaining so damp that fire could make no progress. Work is now being done on the trail on Rowanet creek hill, with four men on the divide headed for Mill creek. The work will be carried on by night. Those toward the Williams river.

Mr. Thomas says the grading work on the Rowanet road is about half done and is a splendid job. He thinks it will be completed next spring, and then it will be possible to run right through from Marshfield on high, as light are the grades.

Highly Appreciated Visit

R. E. Brown, who represents the Hergentzler Linotype company in Oregon, southern Washington and western Idaho, was a very welcome caller at the editorial office Wednesday. Our linotype has been running for nearly five years, and though we expected an inspection visit by a representative at least once a year when we purchased it, owing to war conditions this is the first time it has been looked over by an expert in all that time. But Mr. Brown understands the machine from the ground up and gave us all needed suggestions to increase its efficiency, so that it is now running on high again. Incidentally he informed us that it would cost \$4,000 to buy another machine like the Sentinel's at the present time, which is 50 per cent higher than the price five years ago.

Teachers Institute Oct. 20-22

The fall meeting of the county teachers' institute will be held at Myrtle Point in the Southern church, beginning at 10 o'clock Wednesday, Oct. 20 and lasting three days. The outside instructors this year will be Ida Mae Smith and Mr. Beattie from the State Normal school; Prof. Peterson, of the University of Oregon; Miss Edna A. Cook, head of the department of physical culture for women at O. A. C.; State Superintendent J. A. Churchill; Mr. Henry Grant from the Oregon Social Hygiene society and Mrs. Katherine Gagnon.

Bible Course in City School

T Bridge to Be Repaired

The T bridge has been undergoing repairs this week which will put it in shape for traffic and enable the council to close up the Taylor street all for the winter. City Engineer Gould estimated that the total cost of making the repairs would be \$125 and Mr. Hurd offered to do it for that amount—lumber, labor and everything—and the street committee employ him to do it.

This will leave \$150 to spend on a walk from the T bridge to the school house, which Mr. Hurd says will cost less than \$50 for it and still be within the \$250 which Mr. Hurd promised with the bulk of what the council would split 50-50 with the school board.
