Resigned When Term Ended
To the Voters of Coos County, Oregon:
I have been informed that certain persons are making statements claiming that I resigned the office of County Judge in 1914 before my term of office had expired. This is a mistake. I was elected County Judge in 1910 for the term of four years, I served the full term and until my successor was elected and qualified. At the November election in 1914, the constitution of Oregon was amended so as to make the term of office of county judge six years. It was claimed by some that the judges in office at that time would hold over for two years longer. I did not construe the law that way but held that a county judge elected at that election was entitled to the office, on the first Monday in January, 1915.
I wrote the Governor to get his opinion or the opinion of the Attorney General and at the same time expressing my own opinion to the effect that I did not think that I was entitled to the office for the reason that my term had expired and that my successor had been elected and qualified. Later I received over the telephone a message from the Governor (Withycombe), stating that he had taken the matter up with the Attorney General and that my term of office had expired and that my successor was entitled to the office. This question was afterwards carried into the courts and the Supreme Court of this state in the case of Phy vs. Wright from Union county, reported 75, Oregon 429, held that the constitutional amendment did not take effect until after the Governor's proclamation, and did not nullify the election of the successor of one previously elected. I did not try to hold an office which I was not entitled to after my term had expired as was done in the Union County case and have the court say that my term had expired. Very truly yours, John F.
