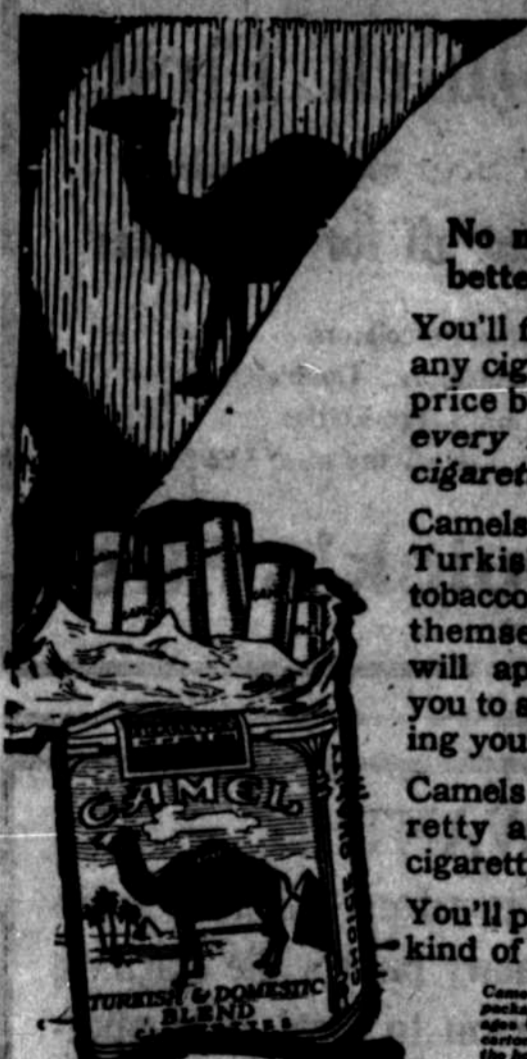
Broke His Hand
