A Pioneer Suicides.

Judge Harlocker, of this city, received a telephone message Sunday from J. M. Hayes, of the South Fork, stating that our old friend and respected citizen, Robert H. Lowe, had committed suicide at his place the day before. It will be remembered that "Uncle Bob," as he was familiarly known, has been a great sufferer for a couple of years, having suffered a stroke of paralysis about that long ago.

The following paragraph we take from Dodge's history of Coos and Curry:

"Robert H. Lowe, was born in Baltimore county, Md., on June 30, 1832, and crossed the plains and arrived in Coos county in September, 1861. He is unmarried and his occupation is that of clerk and railroad."

His advanced age and the hopelessness of his condition are assigned as the reason for his rash act, in fact, he wrote a short note of explanation so that his friends would know that it was not an accident.
