**Sudden Passing Away of Grandma Collier.**

Again we are called upon to chronicle the passing away of another of our old pioneer friends and citizens, this time in the person of Hannah J. Collier, widow of the late Joseph Collier, who preceded her four and a half years. The deceased, formerly Hannah Hathaway, was born June 19, 1823, in the state of Ohio, and died at her home in Coquille, May 10, 1905, at the advanced age of 81 years, 10 months and 21 days. During her girlhood days she lived with her parents in the states of Michigan, Wisconsin, Illinois and Iowa. She was married to Joseph Collier in Illinois, June 22, 1843. They crossed the plains, landing in Jackson county, Oregon, in 1860, and in 1865 came to Coquille where they resided till death.

To this union were born ten children, six sons and four daughters, all except two of whom are living, a son, when but a child in 1852, while their eldest daughter, Mrs. J. D. Waugh, died at Visalia, California, a year or so since, leaving sons, H. J., J. A., B. F., Charles and George Collier, and daughters, Mrs. W. C. Paxson, Mrs. T. A. Walker and Mrs. J. C. Franz to mourn her death, all of whom were present with their families, except Mrs. Paxson and George.

Mr. and Mrs. Collier were among the early settlers of Coos county, their homestead covering a portion of the present site of Coquille, and consequently knew what real pioneer life means, having crossed the plains by team when that was a long and arduous task, fraught with hardships and dangers known only to those who have had that experience.

The deceased joined the Universalists which was the first church organized in this city, and remained a faithful member till 1890 when she united with the M. E. church, South, and remained till death.

The final summons came very suddenly, she seeming in her usual health in the early evening when Miss Ray Collier, who was living with her went to lodge, and on returning found her grandmother in bed, but noticed that all was not exactly as usual about the room and approached the old lady and asked how she was to which she replied that she believed she was dying. Miss Ray stepped to the door and called to some of her companions with whom she had returned from lodge, and Mrs. Walker, who lives next door, and by the time they came in she only breathed a few times, and till the last answered question, saying she was no better.

This has been a long life well spent and the profusion of beautiful flowers was a token of love and friendship by her many friends. The funeral services were conducted in the M. E. Church, South, by Rev. H. M. Branham, and the remains were laid to rest in the Odd Fellows' cemetery, followed by a large concourse of relatives and friends.

**Mrs P. B. Hoyt Dead.**

On Saturday morning, Amelia, wife of P. B. Hoyt, of this place, passed away after a long illness.

The funeral took place Monday afternoon, the service being conducted by Rev. W. Horsfall, in the Episcopal Church.

The floral tribute at the grave was very beautiful and profuse, indicative of the esteem in which deceased was held.
