Clark Loses Timber.

San Francisco, May 23.—The United States Circuit Court of Appeals has handed down the following decisions: United States of America vs. W. A. Clark, Montana judgment affirmed, Judge Gilbert dissenting. This was a suit by the United States to obtain a decree annulling 82 patents for timber lands in Montana on the ground that the entries were fraudulent. Judge Gilbert in his dissenting opinion, says: "I think there is enough in the record to show that facts came to the knowledge of the defendant and his agents sufficient to put them upon inquiry as to the manner in which the lands were obtained from the United States."

Centennial Notes.

The Lewis and Clark Fair opens Thursday, June 1.

Twelve notable organ recitals are scheduled for the Exposition. The recitals will be held in the Auditorium, where a \$10,000 pipe organ will be set up.

A party of 200 Washington bankers, with their families and friends, will attend the Lewis and Clark Exposition on July 20, the opening day of the bankers' convention.

H. G. Higinbotham, who was director-general of the Chicago World's Fair, has accepted the invitation extended by the management to attend the opening exercises of the Lewis and Clark Exposition on June 1.

John Hunt, one of Oregon's oldest pioneers, has built a miniature corn crib, to represent the kind of crib used by the Oregon farmers in the old territorial days, which he will exhibit at the Lewis and Clark Exposition.

Joseph Marvin, Alaskan commissioner for the United States Government at the Lewis and Clark Centennial, is in receipt of a telegram from Governor Brady, of Alaska, telling him that a large exhibit of gold nuggets has been collected for exhibition. Mr. Marvin has secured a special safe for storing the nuggets.

Roy Knabenshue, who gained renown as the aeronaut who made the only successful airship flight at the Louisiana Purchase Exposition, is working on an airship of his own design, which he claims will be superior to the famous "California Arrow," which he will operate in the airship contests at the Lewis and Clark Fair.

An interesting exhibit in the Mines and Metallurgy building at the Lewis and Clark Exposition is now in course of construction. A miniature mountain is being constructed for the purpose of showing methods of coal mining in Washington. The mine will be tunneled, and a miniature car will run around the mountain and through the tunnels. The mountain is thirty feet long by twenty wide and is fifteen high.

Baku, Caucasica, May 24.—The Governor of Baku, Prince Nakachiza, was assassinated at 3 P. M. today by a man who threw a bomb at his carriage. A Lieutenant who was accompanying the governor, and a bystander, were also killed by the explosion, and the coachman is believed to have been fatally injured.
