Centennial Notes.

Friday, June 9, was Oddfellow day at the Lewis and Clark Exposition, and the attendance of members of the order aggregated 3,000. A big parade in the morning and exercises in the Auditorium at the Exposition in the afternoon were the features of the day's program.

The Marvelous Baums, a team of high wire bicycle and trapeze performers, have been engaged to give two performances daily at the Lewis and Clark Exposition from June 12 to July 3. The performances will be given in the open air and free for all.

A flock of swallows have taken up their habitation in the eaves of the eaves of the United States Government building, and all efforts to dislodge them have failed. The Government officials have decided to let the birds remain, and they are proving quite an attraction to the thousands who daily visit Uncle Sam's magnificent display.

Mr. and Mrs. John Hash, of Newburg, Oregon, are the oldest couple to visit the Lewis and Clark Exposition. Uncle John is 79 years old and his wife a year older. Mr. Hash came across the plains in 1850, going first to California, and then to Oregon, but his wife did not come west until 1879. The exhibit buildings are open from eight in the morning until seven at night, except on Sunday, when the Exposition does not open until noon. The Trail attractions are closed on Sunday, but the exhibits may be viewed on that day as on other days.

Fast Train is Wrecked.

Cleveland, June 22.—Nineteen lives were lost, according to late reports, in the wreck of the Twentieth Century Limited train on the Lake Shore road at Mentor. The wreck took place at 9:30 last evening and more than a score were injured.

The record breaking train was traveling at 70 miles an hour when it struck an open switch in front of the Mentor station and plunged with frightful momentum into the freight house, several hundred feet distant.

The train was transformed into a mass of wreckage, which then caught fire. Few people in the forward combination car escaped death or injury. The rescuers fought the flames to recover the dead and succor the injured. The later were taken to Cleveland on a special train and removed to hospitals.

The railway officials say that the switch was misplaced by some miscreant with the deliberate intention of wrecking the limited.
