Butter Making in Coos County.

With this season opens a new era in the production of butter in Coos county. Heretofore the California products have kept a few points higher in the markets than anything manufactured in Oregon, but this season with the introduction of the Pasteurizer, cold storage plants and other up-to-date appliances, the output of the Coquille, or at least a great portion of it stands equal to the first-class article produced in northern California.

While it was a fact that a fine quality of butter has been produced in this section for a number of years, it has not generally been known, as the best of our products have been sold in the markets of the world as, and under the name of California butter, but this season, through the firm of Fred B. Haight & Co., Props of the O. K. Creamery, Coquille butter is being shipped all over the world as a Coos county product, without being rewrapped and on its own merits.

The Coos county building at the Lewis and Clark fair will be formally dedicated and opened to visitors on the 19th. All Coos county people who expect to attend the fair ought to make it a point to be there on that day if possible.

The approaches for the new ferry are completed and have been accepted and Mr. Whetstone was the successful bidder for the conducting of the same. We are informed that the boat is in the water and will be ready for business in a day or so.

A. G. Ely and O. S. Sargent, under the firm name of Ely & Sargent, have purchased the shingle mill and business of R. R. Clarno, formerly owned by Fred Muetzel and Son, of Halls creek. Mr. Clarno has been a great sufferer from rheumatism for several months and for that reason has been obliged to give up running the mill, and in proper hands, turns out a No. 1 article, and we understand the present firm will lose no time and spare no effort in putting the factory on a substantial working basis.

Race Meeting at Portland.

Portland, July 5.—Among the great attractions which the Lewis and Clark Exposition will afford the visitors to Portland during this month will be the opening of the race meeting given by the Multnomah Fair Association at Irvington Park Track, beginning on July 22. More than 500 horses will be stabled at Irvington during the 49 racing days, which by the way, will be the longest race meeting ever held in Oregon. The horses that will start in the stake and handicap events are the pick of those that raced last winter at Oakland and Los Angeles. Such owners as E. J. Ramsey, Doctor Rowell, Harry Stover, Winters & Johnson, and Del Fountain, have entered their stake horses in the events, horses that would have been shipped East, but for the generous purses and stake moneys that the Association have hung up.

When the Association officials made up their stake events last year they were in a generous mood. Knowing that the Exposition would bring lovers of the thoroughbreds from all over the country, they made up their minds that if handsome purses and valuable stakes would attract the best class of horses and the best owners, they would certainly bring them to Portland. This they have done and in all they will distribute over \$100,000 among the winners of the stake events and purses. Such good horses as Horatius, Sea Air, Bombardier, Hugh McGowan, Gloomy Gus, winner of the Seattle Derby; Whisky King, and a host of others that have won winning brackets, will be there. The Lewis and Clark Exposition Handicap will be worth \$1,500.00 to the winner, the Irvington Handicap \$1,200.00 and the Labor Day Handicap is valued \$1,000.00. Many of the horses that will race at Irvington have been racing at the Meadows, and hardly a day goes by but some track record is broken, and as a sample the mile record was out from 1:40 to 1:39 1/2 by Hugh McGowan.

Anticipating one of the greatest race meetings ever held in the Northwest, President A. R. Diamond has kept teams and men at work on the track at Irvington all night and early in the morning. The stables have been fumigated and have been given a fresh coating of whitewash, and painters are now at work repairing the grandstand, fences and paddock. The Association has also announced that from September 17 to September 28 it will endeavor to give a light harness race meeting. Very liberal purses will be given and some of the best trotters and pacers from California will be seen at Irvington in addition to a strong lot of Oregon and Washington horses.

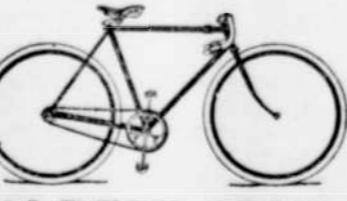
