Death of Mrs. David Roberts. Roberts—In Empire City, Or., June 25, Sarah wife of David Roberts, aged 67 years.

The deceased, whose maiden name was Sarah Reynolds, was born in Brymbo, Wales, and was there married to David Roberts in February, 1856. They came to America in 1869 and to Coos Bay in 1871. They lived first at Eastport and Southport and for the last 18 years have lived at Empire City. Mrs. Roberts was a most estimable woman and was respected and liked by all who knew her. She had been an invalid for about three years. On the day of her death she got up about three o'clock but was taken worse about 5, and died at 11:30 p. m. She was conscientious to the last. Besides the bereaved husband, she leaves two daughters, Mrs. Ellen Peterson of Arago, and Mrs. John Morgan of this city. The funeral took place last Wednesday 2 p. m. from the family residence.
