## An Agricultural Report.

The committee on agriculture's report to the Oregon State Grange's last meeting was as follows:

The dignity of agriculture is steadily asserting itself. Farmers by right of birth and occupation are nature's nobleman. Agriculture is the most ancient of all industries, established by divine decree and proved by experience to be the basis of all national wealth and the promoter of national virtue. Agriculture is also the great conservator of the peace. She can always be relied upon as the conservative element in governments on the side of order and peace against the reckless turbulent spirit or crowded and discontented populations which seek anarchy and ruin.

What vocation can give such a home as agriculture. Home does not consist of bricks and mortar. The humble cottage with its flowers and shrubs will have a greater civilizing influence, engender a stronger patriot and deeper love for country and home that will the most gorgeous palace without its shrubs and flowers. Children of the farm enjoy the wholesome influence of nature's handiwork and the sweet inspiration of the beauty and fragrance of living things, which are denied to the child reared in artificial luxury or to the one born in poverty and squalor in the congested habitations of our cities. The farm home surrounded by nature's bounteous gifts is the citadel of purity. The invigorating and wholesome influences of the natural environments of the farm home, when associated with a proper education, develop the strongest type of men and women, mentally, physically and morally.

Agriculture is the master science. Hence the twentieth century farmer must be an educated man. Labor and learning should go hand in hand, while science should be made the handmaid of toil.

The children of the farm are the woof and warp of our civilization. It is the elevating influence of farm life that contributes to the incipient foundation of statesmanship and develops great captains of industries.

Agriculture is progressive. Methods which are popular today may become obsolete tomorrow. The true farmer is the one who secures the most bounteous crops from the soil with the least exhaustion of its potentiality. We should cease to be soil robbers and build for posterity. To recklessly exhaust the fertility of the soil is a gross violation of the rights of inheritance. The farmer should have a higher aim than to merely live for the present.

Science is the mother of all the arts and industries. Thus science has made clear and distinct to the farmer what in the past was hazy and uncertain. The knowledge of the power of a certain order of plants to assimilate and utilize atmospheric nitrogen is one of the greatest boons ever conferred upon the farmer. This work of science alone is worth untold millions to present and future generations.

The farmer's duty does not end in simply directing the forces of nature for the production of maximum crops. But questions of markets for farm commodities and their distribution, transportation

and problems of assessments and taxation are pertinent topics, each demanding time and careful consideration.

Agriculture in all of its ramifications in this state is making commendable progress. Better systems of husbandry are in evidence on every hand. Farm homes and their surroundings are being constantly beautified, thus showing a higher appreciation of farm life which gives evidence of a general prosperity among our farmers.

Largely through the efforts of the grange a law was enacted by the last state legislative assembly, appropriating \$2500 a year for conducting farmer's institutes. This money, if wisely expended, should prove ample to conduct an active and valuable campaign of education. The farmer's institutes of this state have been a helpful auxiliary of our agricultural college in the dissemination of useful information among our farmers.

We congratulate the grange for its marked progress in elevating agriculture. This class of our citizenship is the seedbed of our national character. Here we sow knowledge, interpretation of truth and moral sentiment in fertile and responsive soil, rich to spring up and grow and fruit and weave into the body of our nation the enduring and invincible fibers of truth, justice and patriotism.—Pacific Homestead.

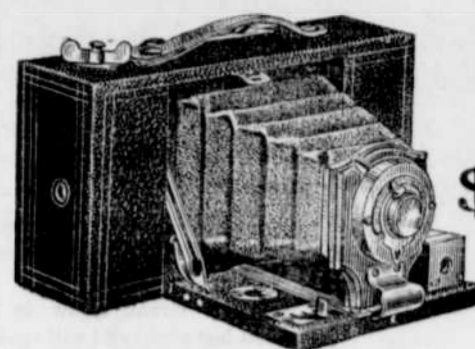
