Coquille Public and High School.

The Coquille Public and High school will open September 11th with a full corps of competent instructors. The Board of Directors has spared no effort to secure teachers of successful experience.

Prof. J. Percy Wells, who has been selected for principal, for the past three years has been in charge of the public and high school of Scio, Oregon, and is highly recommended. He is well and favorably known to several of our citizens, and will, no doubt, find his position a congenial one. Prof. Wells will have charge of the High School.

Miss Ellen N. Beamis, of Forest Grove, Oregon, who had charge of the seventh and eighth grades during the past year, will continue in the same position. Miss Beamis has been teaching many years in the best schools of the state, and her work while here is highly appreciated.

Miss Lucie Newland, of Cottage Grove, Oregon, has been chosen for the fifth and sixth grades. Miss Newland has had a number of years' experience in the schools of Oregon, and is highly spoken of by those who have heretofore secured her services.

Mrs. H. T. Wootten, of Macomb, Illinois, who presided over the fourth grade for the past year, will take up her duties again in the same position. Mrs. Wootten's work while here has been very much appreciated. She is particularly fitted for the work for which she has been chosen.

Miss Inez Lusk, of Myrtle Point, Oregon, has again been secured for the third grade. Miss Lusk has given excellent satisfaction, and will spare no effort to build up the school.

Mrs. J. A. Yoakam, who has had many years of successful experience in the Coquille schools, as well as other schools in this county, will again resume her work in the second grade. Mrs. Yoakam's work is so well known that nothing further need be said in her favor.

Miss Fanny Getty, who has had charge of the primary department part of the past year, and who has been employed by the Coquille school at different times, will occupy the same position the coming year. Miss Getty is a teacher of marked ability, and is now in Portland further preparing herself for this special work.

The Board of Directors has striven to make the school of such quality that it will be second to none. The corps of teachers is a strong one, and is considered by the Board to be the best to be procured, the teachers all being of well known and tried ability, and peculiarly fitted for the work for which they have been selected. In the public school lies the safety of our nation, and parents should make every effort to further its interests.

The High School can accommodate a number of pupils from outside districts, and those having children who have completed the eighth grade work can find no better school in which to place them. A limited number of outside pupils can also be accommodated in the lower grades. Rates of tuition will be made known by O. C. Sanford, clerk of the district. Now for a successful school.

Portland Exposition News.

Considerably more than 900,000 admissions have been recorded by the trustees of the Lewis and Clark Exposition. If this percentage keeps up, the total admissions will exceed 2,000,000, and there is every prospect that the attendance will increase toward the end of the exposition period. This is the experience of all expositions.

California is supporting the Fair most nobly. Already more than 20,000 actual residents of that state have visited the Fair and have registered at the California building. Last week was Southern California week at the Exposition. Large parties of visitors from several counties in the southern part of the state being present. Saturday was Los Angeles day, and there was a general reception and celebration at the California state building. This week several cities in the central and northern part of California have special days.

A solid cake of natural soda, weighing half a ton, which was mined in Albany county, Wyoming, is on exhibition in Wyoming's section in the Mines and Metallurgy building at the Lewis and Clark Exposition. The cake of soda resembles in appearance an immense block of ice. Soda is found in Wyoming, notably in Carbon, Natrona and Albany counties, in deposits varying in size from a few acres to one hundred acres and in depth from a few inches to sixteen feet.

The Custer massacre, reproduced by the employment of United States regular soldiers and Umatilla Indians in a sham battle, will be the big event of August 10 at the Lewis and Clark Exposition. This promises to be the most realistic and thrilling sham battle performance ever undertaken anywhere in the world. The Indians, by the hundreds, will surround the little band of soldiers, one officer impersonating General Custer, and will shoot them down and scalp them—theoretically—just as Sitting Bull's braves did at the battle of the Little Big Horn, in 1876.
