Russians Coming to Their Senses.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 10.—Upon receiving a message from Witte to the effect that Komura is uncompromising on the subjects of the cession of Saghalien and reimbursement for war expenses, the Czar summoned the members of the National Defense Council.

The Grand Duke Nicholas admitted the impossibility of retaking the island or defending the Amur region, and counseled compromise. All adhered to this opinion.

Linevitch, being asked for his views, telegraphed that he was unable to spare troops to defend the Amur region, and that he was not strong enough to take the offensive against Oyama. Thereupon, the Czar telegraphed to Witte to be more tractable.

Fatal Fire in Flimsy Fair Hotel.

Portland, Aug. 19.—Fire in the Stateroom Inn, a flimsy two story structure one block from the entrance to the Exposition, at 2:30 this morning, completely destroyed the structure and an adjoining residence, and incinerated Thomas Sorenson, of Notch Hill, B. C., and an unidentified boy.

Mme LaSalle Lupert, owner of a booth at the fair, was fatally burned. Mrs. Ida Harbs, Mrs. Vansant, A. C. Collander and Joe Stubbs were seriously burned or injured while attempting to escape. There were forty guests, mostly fair visitors. The guests were panic stricken, leaping to the pavement from the upper windows.

Amsterdam, Aug. 17.—A dispatch says that the Chinese attacked the Dutch post of Rambong and killed 24 of the garrison.
