Close Call for Steamer Kilburn.

The steamer F. A. Kilburn had a narrow escape yesterday morning while attempting to cross in over the bar through a dense fog. She went too far to the south and struck on the south spit at 2.25. Here she pounded until 5, when the tide carried her over and up onto Shag, or Guano rock, which station she finally floated and ran into the bay near Charleston.

The residents of Empire were awakened at 4 o'clock by hearing her distress whistles, which were kept blowing at short intervals. Mrs. Captain Magee immediately telephoned to her husband, captain of the tug Columbia, which was lying at North Bend, and the tug started to the relief of the vessel.

In the meantime, the Life Saving crew had started for the bar and ran out alongside of the unfortunate steamer, but seeing that there was no immediate danger, they put back to Empire, on a lookout for the tug.

At 8 o'clock the Columbia reached the Kilburn, a line was passed to her and she was towed to North Bend, where she is lying at present. Her cargo consisting of 450 tons of wheat from Portland to San Francisco, will be discharged at North Bend and reshipped on some other steamer. Fifty-two passengers were aboard, 31 for Eureka and 21 for San Francisco. They have been transferred to the Breakwater, which leaves here this morning.

The injuries to the vessel cannot be fully ascertained at this time, but it is supposed that she is badly crippled. Her stern post, steering gear, rudder and propeller were carried away, while her bottom was more or less stove in. While coming up the bay in tow of the tug she was making a foot and a half of water an hour with all the pumps working.—Mail.
