Dying Girl Sings Her Own Requiem

Abide with me, fast falls the eventide, The darkness deepens, Lord me abide, When other helpers fail comfort and flee,

Help of the helpless, oh! abide with me Chicago, Sep. 26.—(Special).

The last words of the old hymn were uttered in at whisper, the surgeon-in-chief leaned over the operating table, looked at the closing eyes of the butifal girl, pressed his ear to her heart and announced that she was dead.

Miss Clara Butler, daughter of a prominent Morgau Park family, leading soprano in the First Baptist Church there, thus passed away on the operating table at the hospital in Blue Island today. After she had been cruelly mangled by a Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific train. In her attempt to alight after the train had started, her dress caught in the ironwork of the platform and she was thrown under the wheels. She was hurried to the hospital in the faint hope of saving her life by an operation, but it was a vain hope.

Her younger sister, who witnessed the accident, is prostrated and may not recover.

Although she knew death was in the room and fast closing down the span of her life, Miss Butler was cheerful to the end.

"Tell them I am not afraid to die," she whispered to her pastor, as a message to be taken to her mourning relatives in an adjoining room.

Then her voice rang pure and clear as a bell with her favorite hymn. Over and over again, until the song died away to a whisper, she repeated the words, while surgeons and nurses turned to the windows and waited for the end.

In an adjoining room grief was tugging at the heartstrings of her parents and sister; outside, all was life and sunshine and action, while on the white iron table the beautiful singer chanted her own requiem and passed beyond with a smile on her face and a song in her heart, despite the fearful agony inflicted by the car wheels.

At her request, a brief service for the dead was held by her pastor immediately after her death, while she still lay on the operating table.

This is the second tragedy in the family within a year, a brother having drowned in Texas.—Ex
