Myrtle Point's School.

At the close of the first month of the Myrtle Point school a very excellent showing has been made and the management has seen fit to establish the tenth grade, including a two year course of high school work. The attendance has been excellent, and not one pupil had quit school. There are 30 pupils from outside districts in attendance. The total enrollment is upwards of 250, and constantly on the increase, seven teachers being required to do them justice. There are 31 in the 8th grade under the care of the principal, Prof. R. E. Baker, who are making highly satisfactory progress. Myrtle Point certainly has a school of which she is justly proud, and of which she does not hesitate to show her appreciation.

Consideration Goes Over.

Portland, Oregon Nov. 4.—At a meeting of the Portland city council last night the application of Hon. T. R. Sheridan, of Roseburg, for a franchise for an electric car line on Front street was discussed in committee of the whole. Hon. Dan J. Malarkey said that instead of an electric car line from Portland through the Willamette valley, as given out, this movement really means another trans-continental railway line into Portland. Atty. W. D. Fenton, of the S. P. R. Co., Hon. Joseph N. Teal and others strenuously opposed the granting of the franchise asked for. Being unable to reach a definite conclusion the council held the matter over for further consideration.

H. A. Webster, of Oregon City, deputy fish warden, arrived in town Monday and proceeded down the river the same day. Mr. Webster speaks in the highest terms of the work of W. F. Smith, manager of the Coos county hatchery located on Coos river. There are plenty of fish in fine condition from which the spawn will be taken, and the only thing remaining is to hatch and properly "plant" the young fish where their environments will be conducive to the proper development of the smolt making them fit subjects to enter the sea, about which there is some difference of opinions. It is thought by some that it is not all that is required to merely get the fish, fellows hatch and out and turn them loose in a swift and swollen stream full of mud, rolling rocks as well as being abud with various kinds of enemies. It is the practice of Mr. Hume to hold the young fish and feed them till they are more able to take care of themselves on their tortuous trip to the sea.

The Guerin Bros., of Myrtle Point, are again this year shipping large quantities of apples, which is proving a great benefit to those having orchards on the upper river. At one shipment lately by them, 3000 boxes were carried by one steamer to San Francisco. As a matter of course, the more encouragement is given these gentlemen, the greater benefits they will be able to give the apple growers, and the better they can do for the producers, the greater the encouragement for the production of apples, so we see the ball is started rolling in the right direction. If the quality and quantity of fruit now produced can be handled at a profit, with the proper attention given to our upper river orchards and the growing of new and better ones, much larger profits will result, and as soon as the real merits of Coos county apples become established as are those of the Hood river fruit, the market will seek them and they will no longer be obliged to seek a market. For many years our apples have been highly appreciated in California, but the unfair dealings of a number of "San Francisco" commission merchants have made shipping apples to that city unprofitable, but if our Myrtle Point friends have made the acquaintance of reliable dealers there is no question but a good business can be worked up.

The Bandon Recorder came out last week under the management of A. T. Fetter, late editor of the Drain Nonpareil. Mr. Fetter is an experienced newspaper man and will keep the Recorder at the high standard it enjoyed under the management of D. E. Stitt, who sold the paper about a week ago.

Oregon is Launched.

Prosper, Oregon, October 31st.—The launching of the new schooner at this place, Saturday, was a decided success, and owing to the beautiful weather, crowds from different points along the river, transported by the tug Triumph and steamer Favorite, gathered to witness the event. About noon the new vessel slid gracefully into the water, while Miss Sara Fahy dashed the bottle of wine on the vessel's bow, saying "I christen thee, Oregon." The Oregon is certainly a credit to the builder, Mr. E. Heuckendorff, well known on Coos Bay and the Coquille. She is a staunch and seaworthy craft, and one of the finest of the kind built on the river; is 150 feet in length, 34 feet beam, with a depth of 10 feet, and will carry 375 M feet of lumber. She is owned and managed principally by people on the river, and will go on the Coquille-San Francisco run. Capt. Anderson, one of the best known navigators on the coast, will have charge and command of the new vessel.—Recorder
