State Taxes Will be Lower

It is estimated that the total amount of revenue to be raised by taxation for the fiscal year ending December 31, 1906, for state purposes, will be approximately \$625,000 necessary to be raised for the State Agricultural college. Multnomah county's apportionment will be \$123 of this sum, or \$195,187.50.

The marked decrease in amount necessary to be raised in due to the fact that the referendum was invoked on appropriations amounting to \$271,004.40 including in chapter 229 of the laws of 1905, for which there is no provision of law for incurring other than the act itself. Had the act taken effect, the amount to be raised would have been increased by that sum.

Receipts for the current year, other than by direct taxation, amount to \$220,000, which is nearly one fourth of the gross expense; items consisting of \$112,000 from corporation fees and licenses; \$28,000 from inheritance tax and \$54,000 from tax on insurance premiums. It is apparent that by adopting approved methods for raising revenue in time all the expenses of the state will be met without a direct tax. The state levy last year was 64-10 mills. This year it should be less than 1 1/2 mills.—Plainedealer.

Secretary Taft having been one of the members of the cabinet affected by the President's order that there was to be no talking has in turn become a censor and hereafter the reports of Bureau Chiefs of the War Department will not be made public until after the Secretary has edited them. His order was issued as a result of the recent report of Rear Admiral Roe that the United States navy is not in condition to meet another first-class power, because of the lack of efficient engineers.

The government employees of Washington are according to their own story the most abused and maltreated set of individuals in the United States. They are compelled to work seven hours a day and they may be dismissed at any time that the Head of the Department discovers their incapacity for their work. Still these flagrant injustices do not result in any noticeable number of resignations and according to the annual report of the Civil Service Commissioners 148,730 persons took the examinations last year with the hope of entering the ranks of the downtrodden.

The automobile, on account of its cost and the expense of operation, has as yet made numerous inroads on the horse industry, except in the case of high animals. The Old Glory sale of trotters and pacers, now on in New York, shows, however, that the price of these select-bred animals has been affected. Miss Kinney, one of the most promising daughters of McKinney, sold a year ago for \$4650, although she had a record of but 2:17. This year, with a record of 2:10 1/2 and still a young mare in fine condition, she was knocked down at \$2050, or less than half her value one year ago. Bertha K., another good trotter, with a record of 2:13 1/2, sold for \$845. These prices indicate that some of the competitors who in the past have had money enough to pay several thousand dollars for a fast horse are now turning their attention to the more fashionable automobile. Even a two-minute trotter is slow compared with the death-dealing bubble wagons.—Oregonian.
