COQUILLE WINS

High School Team Wins From the Marshfield Eleven by Score of 11 to 0.

At the baseball grounds last Sunday in a hotly contested game of foot ball the Marshfield high school team went down to defeat before the superior force of the Coquille eleven, and the championship of this county went to Coquille, and justly so far her goal has not been crossed this year.

The Marshfield boys put up a clean snappy game and took their defeat in a true sportsmanlike manner.

The features of their playing were Chandler's splendid kicking and the fierce tackling of Cowan and Matson.

For Coquille, the end runs of Fox, Shoup, Dunham and Nosler and the line plunging of Miller, Maury and Leneve were hard to stop and netted many yards for their team, while the stonewall front of the center trio, Wickham, Clayburn and Gilman cannot be surpassed, often breaking through and spoiling the play of their opponents before it was fairly started.

Virgil Wilson who played right end in the second half put up the game of his life and was to be found in every play.

Grimes at quarter played a heavy game and handled his team like a veteran.

THE GAME.

Coquille won the toss and took the kick-off, Marshfield taking the south goal with the wind in their favor. Miller kicked to Marshfield's 20 yd line, and the ball was brought back about 5yds and downed. Marshfield tried a couple of line bucks for small gains and were forced to kick. Chandler bunted the ball and it sailed over Shupe's head who managed to capture it after a hard chase and ran in 15 yards before being stopped.

Then Coquille began a series of plays that were not to be denied. On a wing shift Capt. Fox was

around left end, Marshfield penalized 5 yds for off side. On a tackle Miller bucked the center for 3 yards more, Leneve was called back and sent through for a couple of yards and then Shoup sided by splendid interference skirted right end for 30 yards. Coquille's ball on Marshfield's 5-yard line. Marshfield penalized 21 yards for offside. Miller plunged through center for a touchdown. Miller kicked an easy goal. Score, Coquille 6, Marshfield 0.

Chandler made a beautiful kick to Coquille's 5-yard line and Fox ran the ball back 20 yards. Coquille then commenced an attack that nothing could stop with line plunges by full back and tackles and end runs by half backs and ends soon had the ball on Marshfield's 4-yard line. Miller on a couple of bucks through center carried the ball over for a touchdown. He however missed an easy try at goal. The ball going below the crossbar. Chandler kicked to Coquille's 15-yard line and Dunham ran in 10 yards. Coquille advanced its ball to Marshfield's 30-yard line when time was called. Score, Coquille 6, Marshfield 0.

In the second half Wilson was placed at end, Nosler going to full, Miller retiring.

Marshfield kicked off to Coquille's 5-yard line Nosler made a great run of 25 yards and was downed by Cowan. Coquille carried the ball to Marshfield's 25-yard line and lost on downs. Marshfield tried a couple of of bucks over tackle and had to kick, the ball going out of bounds. On the first down Matson hurdled the line and downed the runner for a loss. Shoup fumbled, recovered the ball and was thrown back for a loss. Nosler kicked 30 yards and the ball went out of bounds. It was brought back and right here Marshfield splendid condition began to show. Cowan was given the ball for a good gain, Chandler followed suit and it began to look bad for Coquille who showed their lack of training. Marshfield advanced the ball to Coquille's 25-yard line when time was called.
