A New Industry.

At a recent meeting of the Coquille Board of Trade a proposition of E. L. Larsen, Danish ex-vice consul to Portland, was taken into consideration. The terms were that if a site be furnished, that a mill of one hundred thousand shingles per day be erected. The board has under consideration the procuring of a suitable site of E. A. Howey near the Coquille creamery, which is an admirable location, and Mr. Larsen has gone to Portland for the purpose of perfecting his arrangements, which he will be able to do in about fifteen days. This is a move in the right direction, as a plant of this kind would add considerable to our pay roll.
